## DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

Lane County democracy met in convention at the court house Saturday shortly after 10 o'clock and was called to order by J J Walton, chairman of the central committee.

The first thing in order was selection of temporary chairman and secretary. L F Wooley nominated E R Skipworth for chairman and T J Hendricks presented the name of J J Walton. A standing vote was taken with the result that Walton was chosen over Skipworth by a vote of 50 to 45.

L Bilyeu nominated L F Wooley of Cottage Grove for secretary and he was chosen by acclamation. E R Skipworth named M S Wallis of Eugene for assistant secretary and he was elected. The following committees were appointed:

**THE PLATFORM**  
We the delegates of the Democratic party of the County of Lane, in convention assembled, do hereby declare the administration of the State Government to be in urgent need of immediate reform; do hereby enjoin upon the nominees, for the legislature, a zealous effort and co-operation to this end; and do hereby appeal to our fellow citizens of every former political connection to undertake with us this first and most pressing patriotic duty.

Resolved, that we are in favor of putting all State officers on a fixed salary, and that all fees earned by any State office be turned into the treasury for the benefit of the people.

Resolved, that we favor a law reducing railroad fares in this state to three cents per mile.

Resolved, that we arraign and denounce the last legislature for its extravagance and profligate waste of the people's money, thereby largely increasing the public burdens, and tending to corrupt the public morals.

Resolved, that we favor the passage by Congress, of the bill known as the Mitchell Kahn Chinese exclusion bill.

Resolved, that we are opposed, and denounce the principle of government subsidies, and we especially denounce and oppose the

Ship-Subsidy bill recently passed by the United States Senate.

Resolved, that private monopolies are indefensible and intolerable. They destroy competition, control the price of raw material and of the finished product, thus robbing both producer and consumer. They lessen the employment of labor and arbitrarily fix the terms and conditions thereof; and deprive in individual energy and small capital of their opportunity for betterment. Tariff laws should be amended by putting the products of trusts on the free list, to prevent monopoly under the plea of protection. That all tariff taxes should be levied for the purpose of revenue only.

Resolved that the democratic party is now, as it always has been the party of the common people, believing always in the principles of equality before the law and special privileges to none.

That governments are instituted among men to promote the general welfare and not for the benefit of the few and for the promotion of cabalistic ends and private benefits.

We confidentially appeal to the people of Lane county to entrust the administration of their public affairs
