The editor of the Oregonian is now in the throes of mortal agony for fear Geo E Chamberlain will be the next Governor. Knowing the futility of saying anything that will do Mr Furnish any good on State politics or on the personal qualities of the candidate, Mr Scott is gyrating round and round over national politics hunting for some buga-boo with which to scare dissatisfied republicans back into line and vote for the new convert to republican policies. His great argument is what does the republican party stand for? and "what does the Democratic party stand for?" But his howl will be in vain for every man knows that political parties are known and stand for just what their leaders are known to stand for. A party headed by a democrat is a democrat party. Headed by a prohibitionist is a prohibition party. Headed by an imperialist is imperialist party; headed by a flopper for Revenue is a flopper for revenue party. *Minister republicans* have no more use for Mr Furnish than Mr Scott does for Simon. They are both in the same boat Mr Scott would like to kill Simon because he bolted and can see no good in him and there are hundreds of republicans in every county who can see no good in Mr Furnish who is nothing more than a bolter. The one bolts in revenge for the treachery of former friends and the other bolts for profit and for office. Of course the editor of the great daily sympathizes with a man who bolts for office but he can't say anything too mean about a man who bolts because he has been turned down by the party he has fought for and labored with all his life. He hates a man who leaves the republican ranks and joins hands with the democrats but he loves the fellow who leaves the democrats and joins the republicans especially if he is hunting an office. He has great sympathy and respect for the successful office seeker. He loves to look at men who can get there even though his own diet is sour grapes. He rejoiced at the defeat of Mitchell and then he rejoices over Mitchell's success. He rejoices over the defeat of Simon and it is a two to one bet that he will dance a little jig over the defeat of Furnish. Consistency is not a jewel in Mr Scott's crown and life long republicans have little faith in his prediction that the world will go to sticks generally and the republican party to the dogs if Mr Chamberlain is elected. His distinction between Furnish and Simon has but little difference. The better class of republicans will not be scared by the thought that Oregon will get into the democratic column for of that there is little danger. It is the strongest republican State in the Union but they will let the political tricksters of their party know that the high office of Governor is not to be bartered away to a renegade bolter for revenue when there are hundreds of able honest and efficient men in their ranks to fill that excellent position.

CHAMBERLAIN SETS A HOT PACE.

PORTLAND, April 24.—George E Chamberlain, Democratic and Citizen's nominee for governor, has outlined his campaign, and will take the field this week in Baker county. He will make the fight entirely on state issues, and make a square fight for reduced taxation, and abolition of all grafts, and to place every state official on a flat salary, as is promised in the Republican and Democratic platforms. He will make a positive fight for a better state government, and especially to cut the seven mill tax levy straight in two in the middle. He will spend no time in Multnomah county, but will personally canvass every county in the state, and make from two to ten speeches a day. Mr Furnish will know there is a campaign on before he has got very far along in the fight.

In addition to making a personal canvass, and telling the voters just what to expect, if he is elected, his committee will reach every voter in the state with the facts and details of the fee system and the state printing graft, as has been prominent in The Capital Journal, and his campaign committee will spend every dollar of voluntary contributions on placing them before the people to judge for themselves.

Mr Chamberlain will permit no money to be spent in buying any ones support, or the support of any faction and his administration will not be mortgaged to any financier, in order to win the election. Mr Chamberlain says he did not seek the nomination, that it came to him unsolicited, and he will not buy the election. His committee has issued its first address to the voters, entitled "A Positive Fight for Better Government," which, in substance, is as follows:

The present campaign shall be fought along lines of positive governmental reform, instead of mere negations. The people of Oregon desire that better conditions obtain, that the atmosphere of politics be changed. It is apparent that the tactics of the opposition will be once more made to attempt to use Oregon as a catapaw to draw national political chestnuts from the fire.

Geo E Chamberlain represents the most hopeful tendencies that have been observed for many years in the politics of the state. Better government, positive reform, statesman-like methods, lower taxes, and the honoring of high character, rather than bowing to the dictation of money, these are offered to the voter in the campaign of 1902.

This hope for better government is strengthened by the selection of the nominee for governor, George E Chamberlain. His official career has been an unbroken effort to administer the duties of his office for highest efficiency at lowest cost. His effort has been successful. It is a fact that no one has yet accused Mr Chamberlain of one official act not actuated by purity of motive. His course as district attorney is an evidence of this. By virtue of his incumbency of that office he has possessed vast powers. It is highly complimentary to him that it has not been suggested by his political opponents that he has used his public office as a private graft. Fearless and just in the discharge of his duty, his record is offered for closest scrutiny, and most extensive comment by the opposition.

It is apparent that Oregon has addressed herself to the task of improving things at home first, with the idea of giving attention to outside matters later. This policy will make for a grander Oregon, for the recognition of those qualities that make up the character of ideal American citizenship. George E Chamberlain will bring to pass this more ideal condition.

G N CASTLE.

G N Castle of Saginaw, Democratic candidate for the legislature in Lane county, is a native of the state of New York where he first saw light fifty-four years ago. His parents resided in New York City most of the time till 1868, when they removed to Iowa. There young Castle became a grauger in every sense that the word implies. Was married in 1871. Six children blessed the union, but two of whom are living. Four sons died from diphtheria, three of them in one week.

Was elected first trustee of Danbury, Iowa, in 1882. Afterwards was elected city recorder two terms, then mayor two terms. Was elected to the lower house of the legislature in 1892; was appointed postmaster of Danbury in 1893 and served four years and six months, being superceded by a Republican on the election of President McKinley. Came to Oregon in 1899 where, as he writes the Guard, "I expect to live until called upon to join the loved ones gone before." Mr Castle's father was a member of the 72nd New York in the War of the Rebellion. Mr Castle closed a letter to us with sentences that have a sterling ring:

"I have always tried in politics and offices of public trust to act and vote so as to converse the best interests of the people, not forgetting my political principles. And I saw the time in Iowa when it required moral courage to stand up for Democratic principles. We were few and far between, too."

"I have a personal acquaintance with two citizens of your town, formed in Iowa. They are the Lombard brothers, Lyman and Atmer. Both these gentlemen are good Republicans, but I am willing to abide by the name and character they may give me."

We believe the reader will agree with us that Mr Castle's kettler has the "right ring." Further that his Cottage Grove neighbor made no mistake when they recommended him as a fit person to represent Lane county in the Oregon legislature.—Guard.
