BIG TUNNEL FOR BOHEMIA.
To Connect the Musick Mine With the Railroad.

P J Jennings was in the Grove
 the past week on business and from
 him we learn that the Calapooia
 Mining & Tunnel Co will soon be
 incorporated, with a capitalization of
 \$3,000,000. One-half of this will be
 set aside as treasury for the com-
 mencement of operations. It is
 the purpose of the company to drive
 a tunnel from the head of Champion
 Basin, near the famous Helena mine
 through the mountains to the Mu-
 sick mine, a distance of a mile and
 a quarter, or nearly 7000 feet.
 Through this tunnel, which will be
 7x8 feet in the clear, the company
 expects to open not only all of its
 own properties, but also those of
 other mine owners whose ledge will
 be cut. A depth of 1400 will be
 obtained, and the large size of the
 tunnel will permit of the transporta-
 tion through it of the ore from all
 the ledges that may be tapped. The
 estimated cost of this tunnel is \$25
 a foot or \$175,000, and it will take
 about 15 months to complete it.

A BIG POWER PLANT.
 Still another enterprise projected
 by the 3,000,000 corporation and a
 necessary adjunct to the tunnel pro-
 ject, is the erection of a power plant
 to cost \$100,000. This will be lo-
 cated on Row river, about 16 miles
 from the terminus of the railroad.
 Power and light will be furnished
 by this plant for the prosecution of
 work on the large tunnel and for
 mining purposes in the Helena,
 Champion, Musick and other near-by
 mines. The plant will be of suffi-
 cient capacity to provide all the
 mines in the vicinity with light and
 power the year round.

Air compressors and machine
 drills will be employed in driving the
 long tunnel connecting Champion
 Basin with the Musick mine, and
 not less than 100 men will be em-
 ployed as soon as the tunnel and
 power plant enterprises are launch-
 ed.

Mr Jennings will return from the
 East about June 15, bringing with
 the company's own engineers elec-
 tricians, who will take immediate
 charge of the work.

CHAMPION TO BE REOPENED.
 Superintendent Behne left for Bo-
 hemia the first of the week to re-
 sume operations on the Champion
 mine. A contract will be let for
 running a 500 foot tunnel. This
 property has been idle for some time
 but it has recently been acquired by
 the Helena people and they expect
 to push the work on this valuable
 property as rapidly as possible. It
 is also stated, by President Jennings
 that it is the expectation of the
 company to soon start up the 10-
 stamp mill on this property.

BOHEMIA RAILROAD
Grading Commenced Tuesday Morning.

Work has been commenced on
 the grading of the Bohemia railroad
 by the Pacific Coast Construction
 Co represented by Campbell & Alex-
 ander of this city. Sunday evening
 about 9:30, four car loads of horses,
 tools, etc arrived from Portland and
 were at once unloaded. Monday the
 company pitched camp near the
 Mosby creek bridge about four
 miles from town and Tuesday morn-
 ing work was commenced. Gangs
 are working each way and are
 making rapid progress. The bridge
 gang under the direct supervision of
 Mr T K Campbell is already at work
 and the right-of-way clearing gang
 under foreman Masterson have
 several miles cleared.

The contract calls for 22 miles of
 finished track; the first 10 miles to
 be ready for rolling stock by July
 31. One thousand tons of rails are
 now on the way and are expected to
 arrive this week.
