**The C M A Band.**  
 The musical organization which  
 has long enjoyed such favor among the  
 loving people of Cottage  
 Grove was reorganized in January of  
 this year. It is composed chiefly of  
 members of the Coming Men of  
 Cottage Grove, which is a fraternal
