INGRAM'S BRAVERY REWARDED BY PARDON

SALEM, June 13.—In answer to an inquiry of The Telegram this morning as to whether he contemplated pardoning Frank S Ingram, the life term convict who was shot by Convict Merrill while trying to protect prison guards from being shot during the out break Monday, Governor T T Geer said:

"I am disposed to pardon Ingram, whose splendid action I believe deserves recognition, and unless valid objections should be raised and presented against such clemency, I think I shall take the matter up favorably in a week or so. There is no immediate hurry, as Ingram is not in condition to be moved yet, and besides I want to give time for all persons to be heard in the matter."

Ingram was sentenced to life imprisonment from Linn County for killing his own brother ten years ago. His wound was in the right leg, which was so badly shattered that amputation was necessary.

CONVICTS ARE IN WASHINGTON

Held up Two Fishermen on Columbia and were set Across the River.

AN INNOCENT MAN SHOT.

VANCOUVER, June 15.—Adding the theft of another team to their already long list of crimes, Tracy and Merrill, the desperate outlaws, between Friday evening and tonight made their way through Clackamas County, across Multnomah from the Clackamas line to a point opposite Fisher's Landing, crossed the Columbia, and now, just a week from the time of their escape from the Penitentiary at Salem, are in the neighborhood of Fourth Plain, Clark County, Washington, with another posse on their track another Sheriff in charge of it, and three detectives from Portland as reinforcements. As it was in the beginning, it is now; they will either be captured or killed, or make their escape. Merrill is now on ground with which he is thoroughly familiar, having been born in Clark County and brought up in Cowlitz, and is thus better situated than while in Oregon. The country is much the same formed of low-lying hills, cut by ravines, and overgrown with underbrush and scrub firs which afford the best kind of cover. As the men are armed with 30-30 rifles and have an abundance of ammunition, it does not seem likely that the desire to capture them will burn any more

set of pursuers than it did in those of the posse that laid down its arms and gave up the fight at Barlow Friday afternoon.

During the passage of the river both men became loquacious, Merrill in particular talking a great deal. He appeared to be thoroughly hardened and expressed himself as being sorry he had not killed Sheriff Durbin in the woods near Gervais when he had the opportunity.

"Why," he said, "when they had those hounds on our trail in the bush we were lying not 50 feet away behind some logs. I saw Durbin at the head of the crowd and wanted to kill him, but Tracy said, 'Now, pal don't shoot; if you let off that gun we'll have our finish right here.' I was just going to kill the — — — just the same when they called off the dogs and went back, and I've been sorry ever since that I didn't finish him when I had the chance."

Vancouver is Merrill's old home. He spent his boyhood here, and as his step-father and half-brother still live here it was thought the desperadoes might attempt to communicate with their friends during the night. For this reason the Vancouver Chief of Police did not take the trail last evening with the Portland detectives, but posted scouts all along the lower river bank and also kept a strict watch over the house of Lem Robinson, Merrill's stepfather, in the hope that he would try to gain some help from his relatives.

Jim Robinson, a half brother, is a fisherman on the Columbia, and it was thought likely that his aid might be sought by the convicts, but, although a strict watch was kept, nothing was seen of the desperadoes in the town.

VANCOUVER, Wash. June 16.—The feature of the pursuit today was the shooting of a member of the posse, by another member, who shot in the belief that he was going to bring down one of the convicts. The fugitives are now in tall timber in the neighborhood of Lewis River.

A FIGHT WITH TRACY AND MERRILL

Two of Posse Encounter the Desperados at Salmon Creek.

ONE MAN WOUNDED.

VANCOUVER, Wash. June 17.—At 2 o'clock this morning a most exciting event occurred, which showed that Tracy and Merrill, if run into a corner, will make a desperate fight for life. They are evidently determined not to be taken, if possible to escape, and if the inevitable should finally come to pass to sell their lives as dearly as possible.

At the hour named, Bart Biesiecker and Frank Davis were on guard on the bridge across Salmon Creek near the place where Tracy and Merrill were believed to be in hiding and over which the military road passes. Suddenly the two convicts appeared. As the escapes swung into range, four guns were raised and four men began to blaze away. Several volleys were thus exchanged Biesiecker was slightly wounded through the shoulder. Whether any of the shots fired by Biesiecker and Davis took effect it is impossible to say. Tracy and Merrill with drew speedily to cover.

Guard Carson has been dispatched for the bloodhounds, and the fight will be kept up, for the determination on the one side to capture and on the other to get away is stronger now than ever.
