## KING EDWARD'S LIFE IN DANGER.

LONDON, June 24.—According to the highest medical authorities of London, King Edward VII is likely to die in the early hours of the morning. At 6 o'clock this evening it was unofficially announced that his condition was extremely critical, and the attending surgeons have requested the royal family to remain in the palace all night.

It was officially announced that King Edward today underwent a surgical operation. He is suffering from Perityphlitis. The Exchange Telegraph Company says the Coronation ceremony is postponed.

SEATTLE, June 23.—A Dawson special says; Collector Davis, of the Dawson Customs office, has been superseded by E S Busby, pending an investigation of irregularities. He is alleged to have accepted a \$1000 bribe to reduce the duty on a big importation.

## HOTEL COLLAPSED.

DALLAS, TEXAS, June 23.—The St James Hotel and the Sherman House collapsed here shortly before 2 this morning, burying a score of inmates but miraculously causing no deaths. In St James there were seriously and about a dozen slightly hurt.

## GORED BY A MAD BULL.

GRANTS PASS, June 23.—Mrs Sarah Harmon, who was gored by a mad bull last Wednesday, died of her wounds Saturday and was buried yesterday afternoon.

## A FIEND IN HUMAN FORM.

BOSTON, June 24.—Jane Toppan, who will be taken to the insane asylum tomorrow to pass the remainder of her life, has confessed to her counsel that she has murdered 31 persons to gratify an insane passion. Some she killed with morphine, others with poisons she cannot remember. She also admitted that she was responsible for numerous fires in the houses in which she had been nurse, and declared that if she had remained at liberty she would have committed many more murders.

## PORTLAND HAS TWO BIG FIRES.

Portland had a \$372,000 fire Sunday.

The fire started in the old foundry of the Phoenix Iron Works, the former Wolff & Zwicker plant, and it is supposed to have been due from sparks from castings made Saturday. A spark, by conjecture lay in the flooring of the building after the men quit work Saturday afternoon; it gradually became a flame.

A careful investigation of the damage done by the fire placed the loss at about \$372,000. Of this only a small portion was covered by insurance. Those whose property was destroyed generally expressed it as their intention to rebuild at once. The Madison-street bridge will be rushed with all possible haste, and a hope is entertained that it will be ready for cars to travel over within several days.

Another fire broke out on Seventh Street, at 11 o'clock Tuesday night which destroyed \$37,000 property.

## TRACY AND MERRILL STILL AT LARGE.

The escaped convicts Tracy and Merrill are still at large, making their way through Washington. Almost every day new crimes are added to their already long list. They are like the flea "Now you've got him; now you haven't."

W E Coman, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon has been making an investigation of the conditions of business all over the Willamette valley and in Southern Oregon and he is convinced that what is needed more than any other one thing, for the development of the country as well as the prosperity of the railroad is more people and he will work in harmony with the department of the Harriman lines recently organized to bring immigration from the East to Oregon and Washington. Mr Coman believes that at least three times as many new people will come to the Willamette valley next year as came this year. It is barley possible that low immigration rates to Oregon and Washington points will prevail this fall, though there has as yet been no definite announcement made concerning this.

Correspondents generally report that while the crops have made rapid advancement and have not yet been injured by drouth more rain is needed, and the indications are that the showers in the Willamette valley, began Monday, (after most of the correspondents had mailed their reports,) will spread to the eastern sections of the State by Tuesday and be of great benefit to spring grain and all late crops.

Fall wheat continues filling nicely and the bulk of the crop is too far advanced to be injured by hot winds. Spring sown grain is making excellent progress. The grain aphid is reported as having done some injury to fall wheat in portions of Linn county, but all crops so far this year have been unusually free from insect pests. Oats are heading rather short in some sections of the Willamette valley. Barley is beginning to ripen and turn yellow.

The first crop of alfalfa has been harvested and the second crop is growing nicely. A large amount of clover has been cut and safely secured during the week. Pastures and range grass are drying up, but the condition of stock is excellent. Corn, hops, potatoes, onions, gardens, and sugar beets, continue doing well.

The weather has been favorable for fruit of all kinds, and the only complaints this week are from Douglas county, where it is reported that peaches are dropping badly. Strawberry shipments from Hood River have nearly ended.
