DEATH AT HIS OWN HANDS.
**A M White of this City Commits suicide at
 Goshen.**
 A M White a saloon keeper of this
 city, committed suicide, Wednesday
 morning at Goshen, by shooting
 himself through the head with a 38
 caliber Colts revolver. The ball
 entered the right temple and came
 out near the root of the left ear.
 Death was in all probability instan-
 taneous.
 The deceased was married about
 six weeks ago. Since that time has
 been drinking quite heavily and it
 is thought that worrying over
 troubles he was insane. He left
 Cottage Grove some time last Satur-
 day and was next heard of in Eu-
 gene. A prominent business man of
 this city met him there on Monday
 and says that he talked very much
 like an insane man. Monday
 evening White came to Bert Nunn's
 residence at Goshen on foot and
 asked for something to eat. He
 told Nunn that there was a conspir-
 acy formed at the Grove to beat him
 out of his property and kill him and
 also a number of others whose names
 he mentioned and among them was
 Mr Nunn. He was given his supper
 and asked to stay all night but re-
 fused saying that "they will be here
 to kill me tonight." Upon request
 he was furnished with some bed
 clothes and went out into a field
 of grain where he spent the night,
 returning to Nunn's for breakfast
 Tuesday morning. After eating his
 breakfast he went up on the hill
 near the depot at Goshen and sat
 under a tree all day returning for
 supper. At this time Nunn tried to
 get his revolver but did not
 succeed. He told Nunn that he
 would return to the hill to sleep
 and if they come to the house after
 him to let him know it. He then
 left the house and Wednesday morn-
 ing was found near Goshen by Mr
 Lutman who works on the rock-
 crusher with the bullet hole through
 his head, with a revolver that was
 identified by parties as his own.
 Coroner Griffin was notified and
 held and inquest over the remains
 Wednesday afternoon.
 The coroner jury returned a
 verdict that the deceased came to
 his death by a pistol shot fired by
 his own hand.
 The remains were brought to this
 city Wednesday night and the
 interment took place at 10:30 a m,
 Thursday under the direction of the
 Redmen of which order he was a
 member.

 cut on his head and he was quite
 badly bruised, though at the pres-

 nicely as could be expected.
