SHOT WHILE HUNTING.

ROSEBURG, July 19.—Yesterday while hunting near Gialla, Lefe Parazoo mistook Alfred Neal for a deer and shot him in the right shoulder, the bullet coming out just above the lung, without breaking any bones.

The boys started out on their hunt; they separated and were to meet at a neighboring camp some distance from their own. Neal had not proceeded far when he soon started a deer, and was trying to head it off. Parazoo had also seen the deer, and as he saw Neal moving through the brush mistook him for the creature and fired at a distance of about 150 yards, with a g2 40 repeating rifle. Neal was able to be brought to Roseburg, and was taken to Dr. Houck's office, where the treatment was administered. The young man will to all appearances, recover in a short time.

RAILROAD EMIGRATION COMMITTEE VISITS COTTAGE GROVE

While the public generally may not fully realize it, last Wednesday was a "red letter day" in Cottage Grove and the surrounding country, being the occasion of a visit from the General Emigration Agent of the great Hartman system and his corps of able assistants, accompanied by some prominent railroad officials of the Southern Pacific Company and of the Northern Pacific, to Cottage Grove, with a view of becoming acquainted with the people and gaining a better knowledge of the country and its resources, for the purpose of advertising the same and inducing emigrants to this country and especially to the Willamette valley and Southern Oregon.

The party consisted of G. M. McKinney, General Emigration Agent; C. McKinzie, H. A. Townsend, W. H. Burke, I. A. Kruse, I. A. Conklin, assistants and R. M. Hall, advertising agent, besides J. P. Jones, T. P. A. of the Southern Pacific, H. F. Launburg, T. P. A. of the same company, and J. K. O'Neil, T. P. A. of the Northern Pacific.

The party were met at the Southern Pacific depot by a committee composed of the principal business men of the town and conducted to the commodious parlors recently fitted up in the Garman & Hemenway building by the genial Alfred Johnson, Manager of the LeRoy Mining Co. and formally introduced to those present, after which the meeting was called to order by Mayor Job in a few well chosen remarks, at the conclusion of which he introduced Mr. McKinney who in a very interesting, able and entertaining manner outlined the objects and purpose for which the itinerary of the party had been undertaken.

The object and purposes for which these parties are making their journey through the state of Oregon at this time is to get acquainted with the people and the wonderful resources of the country and to unite with the people in an effort to induce emigration to come to this country and especially to the great Willamette valley and Southern Oregon.

From the information given out by the gentlemen it appears that the people in whose interest he is working have set apart the magnificent sum of \$100,000.00 to assist in securing emigration to this country from the middle western states and desires the co-operations of the people of the different cities, towns and communities in this valley and southern Oregon, to join with them in a united effort for their common good.

This emigration bureau which the Harman system has established is going to spend the amount of money appropriated for the purpose in inducing people to come west and settle in Oregon, but will advertise no particular locality or the resources of no particular community, but will advertise the same in a general way and expect each locality to make a special effort to place before the intending emigrant the peculiar advantages which their section possesses, and that if the

people of the community will publish at their own expense the proper and necessary literature that the Bureau of information of which Mr. McKinney, its chief, will see that the same is thoroughly circulated and distributed where it will do the most good and that in addition to this that the assistants Mr. McKinney will use their personal efforts in advertising the resources and advantages of any particular community whenever and wherever inquiries may be made by intending emigrants.

Unless the people of this community do something in the line of advertising through this medium, people will come to Oregon, but will stop at or pass on to cities and towns where there has been some effort made to show up the superior advantages of their particular section of the country and Cottage Grove cannot afford to be behind her sister towns in the Willamette valley and southern Oregon, each of which have assured the agents of this concern that they will publish and place in the hands of Bureau literature advertising and showing up the the superior advantages of their particular communities at their own expense.

Remarks were offered by other members of the visiting party as well as by many of the business men present, all of which teemed with enthusiasm and words of encouragement, at the conclusion of which it was voted to be the sense of the meeting that the people of Cottage Grove and vicinity guarantee the bureau 50,000 copies of a suitable pamphlet setting forth the great resources and advantages possessed by this section of the country, after which light refreshments were served and the party reluctantly bade the good bye and departed for Eugene, regretting that their stay could not be prolonged in order that they might take a trip over that portion of the O & S E R R which has been completed which could not be done owing to the lateness of the hour, although this part of the arrangement had been previously planned by the reception committee.

Ashland, Grants Pass, Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, Albany and all the other principal towns in Southern Oregon and the Willamette valley have guaranteed this Emigration Bureau from one hundred and fifty thousand down to not less than seventy thousand copies of a pamphlet advertising and setting forth the peculiar and particular advantages possessed by their respective communities and Cottage Grove, possessing more advantages and with more wonderful undeveloped resources cannot afford to be outdone in the matter of advertising the same or of inducing desirable emigrants to come and settle among us and aid and assist in the upbuilding of a community that with the proper efforts of her citizens will be second to none in Western Oregon.

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—The body of Mrs. H. A. Smith was found floating in the Willamette river this morning. A note, stating that she was going to commit suicide and bidding her family farewell, was found pinned on her jacket. The cause of the rash deed is not known. She was 64 years old.
