A Can of Coal Oil Exploded And Burned Two Children to Death.

ASHLAND, Aug 9.—A most shocking accident took place at Klamath-ton, south of here yesterday evening, resulting in the death of two children, Lester and Emery Davis, aged 6 and 3 years. They were the children of Mrs Laura M Davis, who conducts a millinery store there. The two children were playing in the yard in the rear of their home with some parlor matches, and close by was a 5 gallon can of coal oil. In some way the can become ignited, exploded and covered the little ones with a blaze of fire. With their clothing aflame they started to run for the Klamath river which is near by but one fell and its outeryes brought assistance. An attempt was made to smother the flames and the burning clothing was taken from the persons of the little ones but the flames had already performed their deadly work and after lingering in great agony, both died at 7:30 o'clock.

MORGAN'S BIG DEAL

With British Government Has Not Yet Been Concluded.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—In the House of Government had been engaged in negotiations relating to the Morgan Atlantic shipping combination but unfortunately, though no fault of the Government, he was not yet able to make any statement as to the probable outcome of the matter.

WRIGHT NOT YET LOCATED.

Since the first report was received by the officers three weeks ago that Harry Wright had been seen in the vicinity of his former home in the Wolf Creek country, about 20 miles west of Eugene, considerable effort has been made to locate the alleged accomplice of Tracy and Merrill in there escape from the penitentiary, but without success.

Beyond the fact that he was known to be with friends three weeks ago, nothing can be learned of his whereabouts or his movements. It is still believed, however, that he is yet in this county, being kept in concealment by friends, and that the officers will finally locate and capture him.

EARTHQUAKE IN SKAGWAY.

SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—Yesterday a most severe earthquake was felt here about noon. The first shock was 50 seconds long, rattling things up generally. Several large plate glass windows were broken. Chimneys in the northern part of the city were tumbled down. The water in Lynn Canal rose five feet very suddenly, then subsided as quickly. A report from Juneau this morning says the little fleet there was pitched around and several capsized. The first long shock was followed by a lighter one.

Yesterday evening at 7 o'clock another light shock was felt.

RELIC SEAKERS.

When the Sheriff Gardner and his posse arrived at Davenport Thursday with the outlaw's remains the whole town went wild.

"Hurrah for Lincoln County," was the cry, and it was with great difficulty that the crowds were forced back enough to admit the passage of the body into the morgue.

Insistent demands to see the remains were made by the excited people, and after a time many were admitted. Then the trouble started. Relic hunters were everywhere, and within ten minutes the corpse was almost entirely stripped. His clothes were cut off, the bloody cloth with which he had tried to staunch his wounds and the strap he had used as a ligature were all carried away and even the head of the dead murdered was almost entirely shorn of hair.

Great indignation has been expressed over the occurrence, and it is not unlikely that many prosecutions will follow.

PORTLAND CARNIVAL OPENING DAY.

Opening day of the Portland Elks' Carnival will be made memorable by the mammoth parade through the streets headed by the queen and her court, with maid of honor, courtiers, ministers, heralds, pages and subjects in attendance, followed floats and the Jabour Oriental show. In this section of the great parade will be 14 cages of wild and performing animals, elephants, camels, troops of mounted Arabs, dogs and ponies, Oriental performers from far Eastern countries, including Turks, Arabians, Syrians, Egyptians, Bedouins, Hindoos, Cingalese, Russians, Japanese, Mexicans and many others. The Elks will turn out in large numbers and Portland will look gay with this great pageant moving through the streets on the inaugural day of the carnival.

MORO SAVAGERY.

MANILA, Aug 13.—The bodies of Sergeant Foley and Private Carey of the U S army have been found where they were murdered by treacherous Moros.

The natives had mutilated the bodies in an unspeakable manner.

TUG BLOWN UP.

NEW YORK, Aug 13.—An ocean tug was blown up near St George, Staten Island, this forenoon.

Captrin Jones and five of the crew were killed.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Medford Farmer Killed During a Heavy Thunder Storm.

MEDFORD, Or, Aug 12.—During a heavy storm here this evening Richard Paine, a farmer, living about two miles south of Medford, was killed by lightning. He was a member of the Woodman of the World, and left a wife. Further details cannot be learned on account of the telephone having been disabled by the storm. About one inch of rain fell here.

RAISING SPANISH SHIPS.

The navy department has awarded contracts through the commandant of the navy yard at Cavite to the Philippine Engineering & Construction Co for raising the Spanish war ships Admiral Dewey sank in the famous battle of Manila Bay. The contract includes the wrecking and dismantling of such of the ships as are unfit for further use. Nine of them are so badly damaged that they are not worth raising. The work has already begun and is to be completed within a year.
