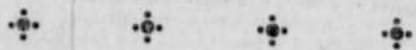

NO VISIBLE RESULTS YET

But Mitchell and Labor Presidents are Still Conferring.

WASHINGTON, Oct 7.—The following announcement was made from the White House this afternoon: On Monday Hon Carroll Wright, commissioner of labor went to Philadelphia and gave John Mitchell the following from the President: If Mr Mitchell will secure the immediate return to work of the miners, the President will immediately appoint a commission to thoroughly investigate all matters at issue, and do all in his power to obtain a settlement of the questions, in accordance with the report of the commission.

Mitchell has taken the matter under consideration, but the President has not yet been advised of any decision.

The President's Proposition

Does not Meet with Favor among the Striking Miners.

BUFFALO, Oct 7.—The conference between Mitchell and the Association of Manufacturers adjourned to meet tomorrow in Philadelphia, where they hope to have the operators present. The manufacturers will try to influence the operators to arbitrate.

Mitchell declares the miners will not accept Roosevelt's proposition to return to work, pending investigation of their grievances.

Rioting And Bloodshed Raging In New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS, Oct 7.—An attempt to run the street cars this morning precipitate a street riot. There non-union motormen and one conductor were beaten. Three cars were wrecked and left standing in the street. The police are unable to cope with the situation.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct 8.—The street railway companies have been trying to obey the order of the Mayor and run their street car under the protection of the militia.

The situation is desperate. Bloody battles have been fought at intervals all the forenoon between the mob and militia. Many have been killed and wounded.

More serious trouble is feared tonight as the strikers are wild with rage and are being joined by the disorderly element.

LARGE AMOUNT OF DELINQUENT TAXES.

\$7,484.42 Remained Unpaid When the Rolls Closed Monday, Oct 6.

Taxes became delinquent on Monday, October 6th, and hereafter those who did not pay before that date will be levied upon and the cost of the levy will be added to the penalty already attached under the new law.

The amount of Lane county taxes which became delinquent on Monday, according to the figures in the sheriff's office, is \$7,484.42, which is a very large delinquent, more than for any year in several years past.

The only way of accounting for this large delinquency is that the new law is unsatisfactory or is misunderstood.

Another Convict Escapes

FOLSOM, Calif, Oct 8.—Convict Murphy, the fireman on the prison engine at the state penitentiary adjacent this city, made his escape from the penitentiary grounds on the engine this forenoon. The prison guards fired about a hundred shots at the escaping convict, without effect it is thought.

Murphy left the engine at Alder Creek and took to the woods. A posse is in pursuit.

WILKESBARRE Pa, Oct 8.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon, after hurried preparations, President Mitchell and three district Presidents rushed off to New York. Shortly after 2 o'clock President Mitchell received a telegram from New York which immediately changed his plans. He hastily summoned the District Presidents with an evident air of jubilation. He refused to say anything. It has been learned on what seems to be good authority that the message was from a prominent coal operator and it is believed Mitchell and his colleagues will be asked to name terms for settling the strike. The party will reach New York at 9 o'clock tonight.

Good Roads Convention.

The good road's Convention will be held in Portland October 14 and 15th. The S P Co have made a reduced rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip and a large body of people who are interested in the good roads movement are expected to attend. Considerable interest has lately been manifested in this movement and some profitable results are looked for.
