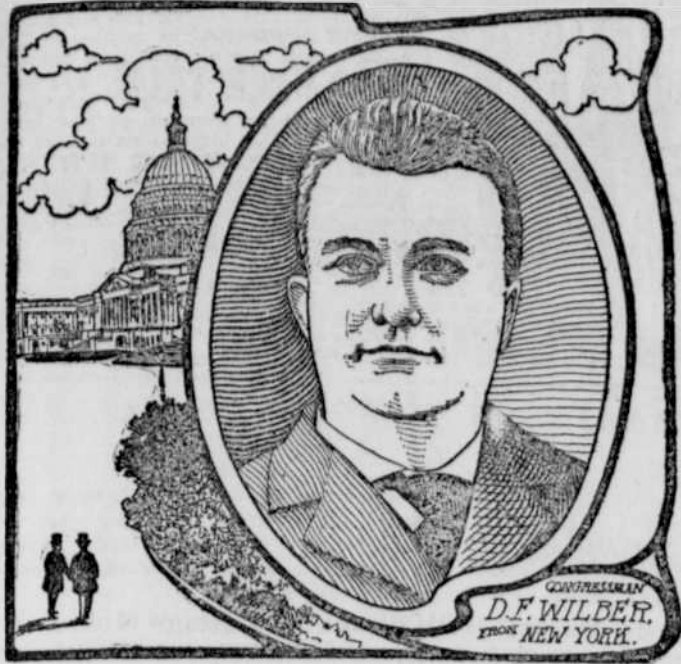

Science AND Invention

Garlic juice, inhaled under certain conditions, is the remedy with which Dr. W. C. Uinchin, of Kells, Ireland, claims to have cured advanced tuberculosis.

The oxy-acetylene blowpipe of M. Fouche, easily melting most metals, burns a mixture of one part of acetylene to 1.8 of oxygen. Explosion in the blowpipe is prevented by moderate pressure.

The latest development of screw propellers is due to C. A. Parsons. The blades are given reduced pitch toward their tips, small vanes being also provided on the propeller-cone, and the effect is to admit of high speed without cavitation, and to give a greater mean thrust than is possible with blades of constant or increasing pitch.

A British engineer's new device for steering twin-screw steamships consists of a special throttle valve attached to each set of engines, the valves being connected to a tiller by bell cranks and linkwork. When the tiller is moved either way from its central position, one throttle valve reduces the steam of its set of engines, diminishing the speed of its screw to a degree varying with that of the turning of the tiller.

Near Quebec a railroad bridge across the St. Lawrence River is about to be constructed with the longest single span of any bridge yet in existence. It is of the cantilever construction, and the length of the great channel span over the river will be 1,800 feet, more by 200 feet than the span of the Brooklyn suspension bridge, and by 100 feet the chief span of the celebrated Forth bridge in Scotland. The towers will rise 300 feet above the high-tide level of the river. Two railroad tracks and two electric railway tracks, besides roads for wagons, will be included on the bridge.

It is an interesting fact that the old University of Heidelberg has within recent years taken the lead of all other centers of astronomical observation in the discovery of asteroids, or minor planets. Of the thirty-six new asteroids found in 1901, all but one were discovered at Heidelberg. The photographic plate has entirely superseded the human eye in these discoveries. This fact is mainly due to the extreme faintness of the asteroids that are now being picked up. Dr. Bauschinger estimates that very few of these bodies brighter than the tenth magnitude remain to be discovered, but the number of fainter ones shows no signs of exhaustion.

A novel experiment lately shown the London Royal Society by T. C. Porter was performed with a little water in a beaker having nearly vertical sides. When the water was rotated about a vertical axis, the pressure was least in the center and increased outward, and when near boiling point and heat was applied, steam formed only in the region of least pressure producing a gaseous core. The rotation was set up by stirring with a rubber-covered glass rod. Curious phenomena were shown by the column of steam when the water was first stirred and allowed to come to rest while still being heated, the water at first having a concave surface and the core of steam being practically continuous from bottom to top. This was followed by a stage of perplexing pulsations. Some forms of the steam columns resembled solar prominences, and it was suggested that the latter might be due to diminished pressure near the center of cyclones in the sun's atmosphere.
