Eastern Elections are Over. Democrats make gains in the Lower House of Congress.

New York, Nov. 4.—Late returns from remote districts show a falling off in the O'Dell vote. O'Dell's estimated plurality is now 8,500.

William R. Hearst, proprietor of New York American, elected congressman from eleventh district.

New York, Nov. 4.—The City of greater New York, which last year elected a fusionist to the mayoralty, returned to democracy today and rolled up one of its old-time majorities for that party. Locally, the candidates voted for were three justices of the supreme court, 19 members of the national house of representatives, 21 state senators and 62 state assemblymen. In King county the sheriff and in Queens county the district attorney were elected. Coler's plurality for governor in the city was well above 100,000.

Edward B. Amend, Vernon M. Davis and Edward E. McCalla, Tammany hall democratic candidates, were elected to the supreme court by pluralities of from 70,000 to 80,000. The vote cast to day showed a remarkable change of feeling from last year, when Mayor Low carried New York county by 5,000.

at hand indicate that if Lane, democrat nominee for governor, maintains present gains he will be elected by a small plurality. The republican committee has reduced its claim for Pardee from 10,000 to 500. With the exception of governor republicans will probably elect the entire state ticket but have lost one and probably three congressmen. Loud in fifth is defeated and Gillett in first and Coombs in second are running behind their ticket. The remaining five congressmen are, according to present figures, republican.

The following is a summary of the situation:

Kansas—Republican, 25,000. Elects entire congressional delegation.

Ohio—100,000 Republican.

Massachusetts—Cuts down Republican plurality to 25,000. Democrats elect at least four congressmen.

Colorado—Apparently carried democratic.

Nebraska—Doubtful, Seems to have elected Thompson, Fusion, for governor.

Iowa—Republican, 60,000.

Missouri, Arkansas, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Texas, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, Louisiana customary Democratic majorities.

Connecticut—Republican 15,000.

Montana—Republican, 15,000.

Wyoming—Republican, 4,000.

Kentucky—Ten democrats, and one Republican congressman.

Maryland—Three Republicans, two Democrats, one doubtful.

Pennsylvania—Pennypacker, Republican, governor, 60,000.

Indian—Republican state ticket, Congressional delegation unchanged.

Wisconsin—Re-elects LaFollette, Republican governor with about 47,000 plurality, and 10 republicans and one democrat for congress.

New York—Re-elects Odell, Republican, governor with 10,000 majority and returns Republican

HALE JOHNSON, NOTED PROHIBITIONIST, KILLED IN AN ALTERCATION.

EFFINGHAM, Ills., Nov. 4.—Hale Johnson, vice presidential candidate on the prohibition ticket in 1896, was shot and killed by Harry Harris this afternoon at Bogota, Jasper county. An altercation occurred between Johnson and Harris and the latter fired at close range, the bullet striking Johnson in the face and causing instant death. Harris attempted to escape, but was arrested.

Later—Harris committed suicide in the county jail tonight by taking poison.

HAVANA, Oct. 27.—The representative here of the Associated Press has learned from official sources that the proposed treaty between the United States and Cuba was returned to Washington by mail last Saturday. With the treaty was sent a counter-proposition by the government of Cuba to that of the States, the nature of which is not known, but it is understood that President Palma, in a letter sent with the treaty, says the acceptance of the propositions made by the United States would be ruinous to Cuba, as it would result in a large reduction of the customs revenue of the island.
