DILLARD—Robt M Dillard one of our most highly respected citizens and pioneer farmers passed away quietly at his home Saturday Nov 8. Mr Dillard was aged 65 years and came to this valley early in the fifties with his father's family and soon after settled near his place where he has lived continuously until his death. His illness was of short duration being bedfast only a few days. Mr Dillard was a man of strict integrity and did much to build up both the moral and social sentiment of Cottage Grove in its early days and he leaves a host of substantial friends who with his bereaved family grieve over his sudden demise. He leaves a wife and brother, Rufus Dillard, of Eastern Oregon, but no children.

STEVENSON.—Calvin Stevenson died at his home Monday morning, after a long and severe spell of illness. He leaves a wife and two children to mourn his death and the bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community. Mr Stevenson was 70 years of age and has been among Cottage Grove's most prominent business men for the past 25 years.
