DIED.

CONNER.—At the home of her daughter, Mrs W H Beidler, in the Calapooa Valley, Douglas county, Oregon, Friday, Jan 30, 1903, Mrs C Conner, aged 77 years, 8 months and 16 days.

"Grandma" Conner, whose maiden name was Mary Terwilliger was born in New York State, May 14, 1825. With her parents she moved to Ohio, where she was married to Horace Conner February 19, 1843, from which union three children were born, two daughters and a son, of whom two survive her, Ira Conner, of Cottage Grove and Mrs W H Beidler of Calapooa Valley, the elder daughter, Mrs Ella Cumpston, having died in Shelby county, Illinois in May 1876. Of the three families, representing the children of deceased, there are 14 surviving grand-children, and several great grand children.

Early in the sixties deceased suffered severely from an attack of brain fever which effected the optic nerve to such an extent as to render her sightless, although the eyes retained their natural appearance. Notwithstanding this terrible affliction she has ever remained cheerful and happy, her pure devoted Christian life casting naught but sunshine and gladness all about her, and endearing her to all with whom she formed an acquaintance.

She was left a widow by the death of her husband in Linn County, Kansas, July 15, 1870. With her son and daughter and families she came to the Pacific coast in 1873, locating in Sonoma county, California, from which state the families came to Oregon in the summer of 1878 and located at Cottage Grove, Lane county. In 1899 deceased with the family of her daughter, Mrs W H Beidler, took up her residence in the Calapooa valley this county, where she has resided up to the time of her death. Grandma Conner early in life united with the Methodist Episcopal church and has always lived a devoted, faithful Christian, finally passing away triumphantly in the unswerving faith she had so long lived. She was a kind affectionate and faithful mother, and her saintly presence wise counsel and earnest prayers will be sadly missed by every member of the family who will long cherish and honor the memory of mother and grandmother.

The funeral services were largely attended by neighbors and friends and were conducted at the family home at 10 o'clock Saturday by Rev C A Hyatt of Oakland who read from the 23rd Psalm, which was a favorite text of the deceased. The songs selected were also those dearest to the saintly departed. The remains were tenderly laid to rest in the I O O F cemetery at Oakland, Oregon, Saturday afternoon, the last day of January.
