Since '86 when operations began in the Broken Hill mine in Australia, it has yielded over 70,000,000 ounces of silver and 300,000 tons of lead. For the past six years it has paid 50,000,000 in dividends. In the first three years it paid about \$500,000 a month in dividends; but since the fall in the price of silver, it has been paying about \$250,000 a month. There are about 16,000 stockholders in the concern.

The prune crop in this community, says the Newburg Graphic, is now pretty well gathered, and, as the Graphic has been able to ascertain, a large number of the growers have found that the estimates they put on their orchards a few weeks ago was much too low, so that the Graphic's estimate of 25,000 bushels of green prunes for the immediate vicinity of Newburg was no doubt a safe one. The crop is likely to go considerably over these figures rather than below them.

The reports show that a large proportion of the big corn crop, raised this year in the Mississippi valley, will be fed to cattle and hogs, instead of being sold at unremunerative prices. This is the true policy, remarks a local paper, for the farmers, and they cannot fail to profit by it. Agriculture is a poor business only when the producer is obliged to market his surplus at a time and in a way dictated by the speculators, which is as true of wheat in Oregon as of corn in Iowa.

The best paying black sand beach mine that has been discovered on this coast is near Port Orford light-house. The claim, when first discovered nearly forty years ago, was yellow with gold for over twenty feet in width and three feet in depth, and paid \$200 a day to the man. This claim is being worked this year for the fourth time by leasers. The sand is thrown on a grizzly, carried over amalgamated plates to catch the gold and over moirah cloth to catch the platinum. The platinum is worth \$4.50 an ounce.

Few people have a conception of the extent of the building stone industry in the United States. A report just issued by the Geological Survey shows that the quarry value of the stone produced in 1894 was \$37,377,819, of which \$33,000,000 was used for the construction of buildings. Pennsylvania leads all of the other states in this product, Ohio coming next and Vermont third. Over three fourths of the total product is in a small portion of the area of the country, from Maine to Illinois; and the vast deposit of all kinds of stone in the South and far West have as yet been only superficially worked.

East Oregonian: Joseph Nesbitt, at one time in possession of a fortune of \$1,000,000, made by speculation, died from excessive use of cocaine and morphine, being addicted to the use of the drugs, in Chicago Monday morning.
