ALFALFA IN NEBRASKA.

A correspondent of the Prairie Farmer gives a good report of alfalfa growing in Nebraska.

Alfalfa has proved a grand success in Nebraska the past season. During the last few years a good many farmers have sown a few acres, and some have thirty to forty acres sown. The alfalfa in the Republican valley and on the bottoms of the small streams was cut three times. The yield of hay during the season was three to five tons per acre, which is worth \$10 a ton. Where seed was grown there were two and a half to three tons of hay and five to eight bushels of seed per acre, but some patches did a little better. A twelve-acre patch yielded thirty-three tons of hay and one hundred and sixteen bushels of fine seed, worth \$5 per bushel. The value of the crop on that twelve acres is \$910, a little over \$75 per acre. An eight-acre patch was pastured until the first of June. A crop of hay was cut July 12, and a seed crop the last week in September, and pastured after. The crop in a twenty-acre patch brought \$51 per acre. A ten-acre patch was cut four times, which produced six tons of hay per acre. The value of this crop is \$60 per acre. This patch has been pastured since Nov. 1. These crops were raised without irrigation, and almost without rain. A twelve-acre patch sown the first week in April last was cut three times, and made about three tons per acre. The patch was irrigated. A farmer has a pasture in which is a patch of alfalfa, and stock eat the alfalfa in preference to the clover or timothy. There are about 40,000 acres of bottom land in this county, which are the best of alfalfa lands. Land that will produce a crop worth \$30 to \$75 per acre in a year like the past season is certainly valuable, and those who own it are waking up to that fact. When farmers get forty acres well set in alfalfa they will not fear the worst drouth that comes. Alfalfa is a great boon to this country. Several hundred acres will be sown next spring. The butchers are now supplied with cattle fattened on alfalfa hay, and the meat is splendid. Stock is still running on the prairie, grazing on buffalo grass, and are in good condition.

THE BOHEMIA MINES.

Chas. Hayes, of Junction City, arrived here last evening direct from the Bohemia mines. He says at the present time the snow is only about four feet deep in the mines while last year at this time it was twenty on a level.

The Annie mill is not in operation at the present time and probably will not be for some time. However twelve men are at work on the property running development tunnels. Quite a percentage of the ore in the mine cannot be worked by the machinery at hand it being what is known as "process ore," and is very rich assaying about \$150 to the ton, therefore it is highly necessary that new machinery be purchased in addition to the present plant.

THE SILVER LAKE HORROR.

Mr. J. M. Martin of this city received the following letter from his brother, dated Silver Lake Or., Dec. 26, 1894: A terrible calamity has visited this place. One fourth of the inhabitants have been wiped out of existence in the short space of three minutes. The affair occurred on the evening of the 24th at a Christmas tree.

The exercises of the Xmas tree were held in the hall over Chrisman Bros. store and everything went on beautifully. The recitations, declamations and dialogues were about over and they were about to distribute the presents to a host of expectant people—the hall being literally packed with the young and old, when some boy struck a large lamp with his head causing the oil to splash to the top of the wick, which sent the flame to the ceiling. Francis Chrisman then took the lamp down and was carrying it in his arms toward the door with the intention of hurling it to the ground, when a crowd jostled him, knocking the lamp from his hands to the floor where the lighted oil scattered. They afterwards kicked the lamp out doors and endeavored to extinguish the flames by whipping it with their coats. The more they whipped the more the flames spread so that the people saw their only safety was in flight. They made a rush for the door which opened on the inside and instead of opening the door, were solidly wedged against it so that egress could not be forced. At length through superhuman efforts the men got the door opened and some got out unscathed. The hall by this time was like a furnace. The people rushed frantically to the door, and the scene there baffles description. Men, women and children were piled on top of each other, and very few could extricate themselves sufficiently to get out. Some thought of the windows at the other end and made a rush in that direction where they succeeded in effecting their escape though badly burned. In a short time the flames rushed through the front hall cutting off all chance of escape. Some of the men worked heroically and saved many who would have perished.

Badly burned are: Mrs. Labrie, Geo. Payne, Robt. Snelling, Clara Snelling, Royal Ward, Mrs. Sam Ward, Chas. Hambrick, Annie Egli, Mabel Egli, Bert Gowdy: The most of the others who escaped were more or less burned. Douglas, Columbus and Tommy were there but came out all right. Tommy's head and right ear were slightly burned.
