From 50 Cents To \$1.25 A Day.

S. F. Call: A Mississippi dispatch says that a number of planters have combined to fix the rates of wages at 50 cents a day for men and 40 for women. A Pennsylvania dispatch reports a strike in the Carnegie steel works against an attempt to reduce the wages of men who work about furnaces to \$1.25 a day. The gospel of cheapness appears to be gaining ground in this country. The Carnegies of both North and South are doing their best to prolong the period of depression. The revival of business is admitted to depend upon an increased demand for products, which can hardly be expected so long as men have to work for from 50 cents to \$1.25 per day.
