KEEPING UP THE FERTILITY OF NEW SOILS.

There are few soils which are not made more productive by the addition of manure or other fertilizer. But the profit, either near or remote, must decide food in the soil. The immediate outlay for fertilizers is always large while the returns from the investment may extend over a number of years. The use of manure is therefore almost constantly deferred, especially by farmers in new countries, until failing crops and profit enforce the need of returning to the soil the losses due to constant cropping. The true course for the farmer on new land is to carefully conserve the natural riches of his soil. Prof. E. M. Shelton of Queensland, Australia, formerly of Kansas, believes that this can be done at least expense by a judicious alternation of crops, by occasionally using the new lands as stock pastures by the use of green manures, and by returning to the soil all the wastes of the farm.

SCHOOL FUNDS.—Eugene Register: School Superintendent Stevenson has made up his list of apportionment of school funds to the various districts of the county for the regular April apportionment. The total amount of funds to be apportioned at this time is \$27,753.85. The amount of funds per capita of children of school age is \$2.60. Each school district get \$50 in addition to the per capita apportionment. No funds have been received from the state for this apportionment. All the money coming from the county funds. The April apportionment in 1894 was \$1.10 per capita more than this year, which will make quite a difference in the available funds of a number of the districts. There are now 153 districts in the county. In Eugene there are 1220 children of school age. This entitles the district to \$3222.

TO AID HOME INDUSTRIES.

Important Enterprise of the Chamber of Commerce.

(Oregonian.)

The Portland Chamber of Commerce has entered upon an important enterprise, which touches the quick of Portland's commercial prosperity. Co-operation, hearty and prompt, on the part of the people, is the least they can do to meet the cause half way. The standing committee on manufactures of the chamber is daily in receipt of many letters from the East, inquiring for information from those who wish to locate industrial plants here. The committee finds itself unable to answer these letters satisfactorily, as it does not wish to conflict with home industries already established. It is the desire of the chamber to aid these home institutions, rather than bring in new ones of the same kind. For the purpose of furnishing such aid, where needed at home, the committee is seeking information from every corner of a factory in Portland, and the country tributary thereto, and to this end has sent out a circular to which it is hoped a prompt response will be made. The circular, which is signed by Mr. John Klotzmann, chairman of the committee, and Mr. Frank Motter its secretary, is as follows:

"The standing committee on manufactures of the Chamber of Commerce is desirous of promoting industries here, and wishes to become acquainted with those establishments already in operation, in order to support and encourage home industries, rather than to secure new ones where the field is already fully occupied.

"You are, therefore, respectfully urged to communicate to the chairman or secretary of this committee, at your earliest convenience, a confidential statement of your business, including the number of hands employed, the scope of your business, the territory you undertake to cover, yearly output of your plant in the past and in anticipation, and should you see fit—the amount of capital invested.

"It is desired that you should fully appreciate that it is the intention of the committee, in collecting this information, to gain such a knowledge of our manufacturing establishments as will enable it to secure patronage for home industries, and prevent orders for supplies, etc., from being sent away."

The committee, however, does not wish to discourage new plants from locating here. On the contrary, it realizes that a manufactory is the real meat of a city; that the manufacturer takes a comparatively weak product, and, by his work, gives it a heightened intrinsic worth. It is not only that he employs labor and uses home product, but that he adds the absolute value, economically the most important factor in a prosperous community. The manufacturer's increase return at once to the common fund, not only in wages to his employees, but in his larger demand for the crude product, which he transmutates into gold. In the manufacturer we have the wise bird who lays the golden egg. Portland's Chamber of Commerce does not wish him to be a rare bird in this community; so, wherever there is an opening and a desire to fill it, the committee wishes to be able to give would-be local valuable advice and, to deserving institutions, more material aid.

Creswell correspondent of Eugene Guard: A. W. and W. L. Wallace moved down to Creswell Tuesday where they have leased a piece of clay land on the S. O. Martin place for ten years for the purpose of manufacturing tile. They will erect a large shed under which to dry the tile, and before winter will build a shed 50 feet square over the machinery. Several carloads of tile are used here every season and the farmers are only beginning to tile, so the making of tile in the neighborhood will keep the money at home and save a large sum of freight money to the farmers. We understand the freight on six inch tile amounts to nine dollars per thousand from the nearest factory. That would get another thousand tile for every thousand bought.

GROWING INEQUALITY.

Some flatter themselves that the age of millionaires is passing away and that the great fortunes so suddenly made will be scattered never again to accumulate in a few hands. Why should it be so when landlords are just now increasing their holdings, and heirs of divided estates are beginning life with millions in their several hands? A money making youth starting with five millions at lending doubles his fortune in ten years and in forty years will have eighty millions. Corporations never die and some of these have hundreds of millions, increasing rapidly, too. A landlord owning half of an Eastern state's best largest county formerly leased for one-third the crop, then getting greater advantage for half and now exacts two-thirds, besides forcing his tenants to deal exclusively with his farm teams, wago's, and his stores for merchandise, drugs, etc. His two or three heirs will carry out his system. This is one example of a system in its infancy there. Not one acre would be sold nor a thousand at \$100 per acre. But he is assessed at \$10. If ever the people rule, would they tolerate such a thing? But they do rule more directly in such states as Missouri and Illinois where such things exist and grow daily. Years ago the Chicago News for months exposed the assessments of men owning from ten to fifty millions each, showing they paid taxes there-on from three to over eight hundred dollars. Their marble palaces, stables, horses worth thousands each, pictures costing ten thousand, statuary, jewels, all assessed never above \$800. On the same page pictures of homes or poor widows and assessments against them of \$500 or \$2,000. Yet not one thing was done! And still the people rule! All over the land men and women of the poor who are caught doing labor on Sunday, arrested, fined and imprisoned, yet every Sunday the trains of railways come shrieking, thundering all day long and load and unload freight. We have even known men to be fined for hauling the freight just unloaded away from depots. Yet this is a land of freedom and equality. Men are daily arrested and forced to do unvoluntarily labor in man gangs as vagrants, tramps. Yet so far is this from Columbia that its supreme law framed in every state as well as the national constitution declares, "Slavery and involuntary servitude except a punishment for crimes, are forever prohibited." Oh! Vagrancy, tramping is a crime. Seeing then the tendency of affairs, they who believe that excesses and abuses of the kind we speak of are self-curative are laying flattering unction to their souls. The inequalities that are breeding in our country are not those of fortune alone; and those who believe that the great accumulations of stock fortunes are worse in this effect than excessive monopoly in land are greatly in error.

There is work now before the Federal Land office. An order has been issued for a survey of the Indian Territory. This is likely to be followed by orders for surveys of all other territory in which Uncle Sam has an interest. There are 370,000,000 acres in Alaska, for example, over which to drag the chain and drive the stakes.

An Act for the more Effectual Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly to the state of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Whoever overdrives, or overloads, drives when overloaded, overworks, tortures, torments, deprives of necessary sustenance, cruelly beats, mutilates, or cruelly kills, or causes or procures to be so overdriven or overloaded, driven when overloaded, overworked, tortured, tormented, overworked, deprived of necessary sustenance, cruelly beaten, mutilated, or cruelly killed, any animal, either as owner or otherwise, inflicts cruelty upon the same, shall for every such offence, be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding sixty days, or by fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by both fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. No person or company which carries or transports horses, cattle, sheep or hogs, shall confine or permit such animals to be confined in or upon any boat, barge, railroad car, or any other vehicle of transportation, for a longer period than twenty-eight consecutive hours without unloading the same for rest, for a period of at least five consecutive hours, unless prevented from so doing by storm or accidental causes. Animals so unloaded shall be properly fed and watered during such rest by the owner or owners or persons in whose custody they are, as in case of his or their default in so doing, then by the party or company which transports the same at the expense of said owner or owners, and shall not be liable for any detention of such animals as authorized by this Act. Any company, owner or custodian of such animals, who shall fail to comply with the provisions of this section, shall, for each and every offense be liable for, and forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars. Provided, however, That when animals shall be carried in or upon boats or cars in which they can be and are provided with proper food, water place and opportunities for rest, the foregoing provisions in regard to their being unloaded shall not apply.

Sec. 4. Provides for arrests without warrants by any officer of the law.

Sec. 5. Defines the complaint before the magistrate.

Sec. 6. "The word animal shall be held to include all brute creatures." "Corporations are liable for the acts of their agents."

Sec. 7. Duties of sheriffs and police officers to arrest and prosecute. "All fines of the constitution go to the School Fund."

Sec. 8. Gives concurrent jurisdiction to county and police judges.

Approved, Feb. 20, 1895.

There is also a statute (Oregon Legislature, Feb. 11, 1891) for the protection of seagulls, making it a misdemeanor "to willfully injure, take, kill or destroy any seagull," the penalty being, a fine (\$5 to \$25) and costs add imprisonment in default. Any justice of the peace has jurisdiction.

Our native and important song birds. The Legislature of Oregon has also enacted two statutes for the protection of song birds; the first approved Feb. 20, 1891, protects useful singing birds imported from Germany and elsewhere, naming the nightingale, skylark, starling, redbreast, mocking bird, and others, and making it a misdemeanor to injure or kill them. The statute, approved in February, 1895, protects native song birds and others, naming the yellow-breasted chat, meadowlark, robin, song sparrow, lark, finch, bluebird, snowbird, oriole, hazel-finch, house and winter wren, junco, California lark, warblers, vireo, swallow, tanager, grosbeak, kinglet or horned lark. Both these acts include interfering with their eggs. Penalty not less than \$5, nor more than \$100. This law was approved Feb. 23, 1895.

HARD ON NEWSPAPERS.

The year just passed has been the hardest one on the newspapers that they have experienced since 1869, says the press printer. Very few newspapers have gained in circulation. About one half of the newspapers and other publications in the United States have decreased in size the past year. The number that have been suspended is not definitely known, but it is known that owing to decreased size and suspensions, there is 48 per cent less white paper in the news class used than was the case one year ago. The number of newspapers published today in the United States is 18 per cent less than in 1893, the first year in 25 years that the statistics have shown a decrease. In New York state alone, 273 newspapers suspended publication in 1894, and it is said that this year at least 350 more will pass to the great majority. These figures are compiled from authoritative reports and are no guess work. Of course many newspapers have started, but the number so starting has been far less than the number that have died.—Ex.

RAILROAD BUILDING IN PROSPECT.

The year 1894 showed the lowest number of railroad tracks constructed in the United States for twenty years. This fact marks the severity of the trade depression, for the amount of railway construction is always greatest in brisk times, when the volume of traffic is large, and the prospect of a paying investment leads men to put their money in new lines. In 1894 the total new mileage was a little under 2,000 miles. An upward movement has already begun, according to the Railway Age, of Chicago, and that paper thinks it probable that 1895 will show a considerably larger total. In support of this, the Age prints a very valuable detailed statement, covering several pages, of new railroads or extensions, under contract, surveyed and incorporated. Of the last, however, includes "only such projects as seem to have reasonable prospect of realization."

The total of new projects gives 20,547 miles of new road, built by 373 companies, in the United States, Ohio is credited with 438, by 12 companies. Of course nothing like total 20,547 miles will be built this year, but the Age says that 101 of the roads named in its exhibit, with a total proposed length of 2,938 miles, were either wholly or partly graded or under contract at the commencement of the year, and it seems reasonable to suppose that, with the addition of other lines, something like this mileage of new track may be added during 1895, with a possibility of much more if good times are restored. It is interesting to find that the Age's exhibit shows that new railroads are demanded in every one of the 48 states and territories, with the exception of little Rhode Island and mountainous Idaho, while the number and length of projected lines in some of these sections is surprisingly large. All of which goes to show that railway building is still to be one of the most important industries, and means of the development of the country.
