Change of School Books.

By a vote taken the first of the year in conformity with the provisions of the Oregon school law, a new grammar was adopted for use in public schools. Maxwell's series was chosen to take the place of those that have been in use for the past six years.

I advise districts to make the change during the spring or summer term—exchanging the old books at the exchange price for the new ones. To avoid trouble and to insure a full exchange, I suggest that the teacher or some member of the school board in each district, collect all the old grammars and make the exchange at one time.

The exchange price for Maxwell's first book is 25 cts, for the second 30 cts, and for the advanced, 35 cts. The new books should sell at 40 cts for the first or second, and 50 cts for the advanced. I trust this matter may receive the prompt attention of teachers and school officers.
