BRIEF SPARKS FROM THE WIRES

Budget of News For Easy Digestion From All Parts of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The grubstake Mohican is making another test of Washington coal.

Jack-the-Kipper of tires of bicycles has made his appearance in Walla Walla.

Wahkiakum and Pacific counties in Washington are much exercised over the location of a hatchery for salmon.

A special election will be held in Tacoma in June to validate the over issue of city warrants and to find out standing warrants.

Polk county's hop crop promises big things this season. The vines are growing very rapidly, in many places already reaching the tops of long poles.

Judge Langley, of Seattle, who decided that a contract to pay 5 per cent interest was illegal, because usurious, has been overruled by the supreme court.

Cape Foulweather is now being mentioned as a desirable location for a harbor of refuge. It is estimated that the necessary breakwater could be built there for \$600,000.

The amount of receipts in Lane county, Oregon, for the past year, for school purposes, was \$36,349.55. The disbursements for the same purpose amounted to \$54,665.94.

Fish Commissioner Crawford, of Washington, has issued during this session licenses for 378 pound nets at \$10 each, 131 set nets at \$2.50 each, and 36 fish wheels at \$10 each, making a total of \$4,467.50, which is to be used toward establishing and maintaining a fish hatchery.
