IS HE SINCERE?

The Oregonian June 10, says: The Oregonian approves the effort of the secretary of state to cut off the expense of \$20,000 a year for the state railroad commission. Now, if the state railroad commission would take measures to prevent the secretary of state from converting to his own use in defiance of the constitution, the \$20,000 a year he receives in fees, over and above his lawful salary. The Oregonian would approve that, too. C. J. Good serves another.

There is no comparison between the two offices. The railroad commission is not a constitutional office, like that of secretary of state. It prostitutes its office to do just what the corporations ask it to, while the secretary of state serves the public.

The secretary of state was elected by the people; the railroad commission was not elected at all. The secretary of state performs many duties in addition to those originally assigned to him. The railroad commission does not do any of the duties that the people have a right to expect of it.

Besides, Mr. Kincaid nor any other state official gets \$20,000 a year, or half that. But what does Harvey Scott care for facts anyhow?—Capital Journal.
