OUTLOOK ENCOURAGING.

A San Francisco Wool Commission Man Gives His Views.

Harry E. Wise, of Christy, & Wise, expressed himself this morning on the wool situation as follows, in an interview with the East Oregonian.

"Wool is looking up. There has been an advance of two cents during the past few weeks, and I look for a further advance of two cents. This I attribute to general improvement in business. There has been a heavy advance in iron, and wheat, although temporarily off on the Chicago board, is still much higher than it was before the big movement commenced, and will undoubtedly go up again when the new crop begins to move this fall. Hides, which six months ago in San Francisco brought almost nothing, barely five cents, are now bringing 18 to 20 cents with a heavy demand.

"The general improvement is permanent. Country merchants are buying liberally, but not at all in a speculative way. All purchases from factory and wholesaler are for actual present needs, and a continuance of this will give a steady volume of trade, without the features of fits and starts which have characterized business for two years past.

"Sales in London of wool indicate an advance at the regular London sales which commence in July. Holders of wool evidently have less faith than the buyers in the future of the market since they are selling now in the face of a promised advance in a few days when the big sales commence.

"From what I can learn from people prominent in other lines of trade, we may look forward to the best business next year the country has seen for a long period of time. Our wool clip is about 60,000,000 pounds short, and while under free wool this does not rule the domestic market when the world's supply is taken into consideration, it cannot fail to have much influence, especially in Oregon wools, whose place cannot well be filled by foreign wools.

"Economy has been the motto of consumer and seller during the two years past, and the result has been beneficial in eliminating artificial methods and bringing things down to a normal basis.

"California's clip has moved off more quickly than in any previous season, and through all the handling there was a buoyant feeling and expectancy of better times."

Paper for Hands and Feet. Paper gloves and hosiery are named in The Glove as among the very latest novelties. Stockings, which sell at 3 cents a pair, are proposed. In fact, the experiment of making paper stockings has been going on for several months, and the party engaged therein believes that paper mittens or gloves would possess advantages in their season. The goods are light and airy and very comfortable in summer.

When finished and dyed their appearance is similar to ordinary fabric goods. The knitting is from paper yarns. The paper yarns are made pretty much after the plan of making common paper twines, except that the former are put through certain special processes. The principal is that of making a sort of a nap on the yarn. This is done automatically. Ordinary paper twine or yarn is too smooth, but a good gigning up gives the yarn a nap, and this imparts softness. After the knitting has been done the goods are placed in a sizing bath made from potato starch and tallo, which imparts solidity and durability to the texture.

With paper passenger car wheels, and water pails, why not paper socks and stockings.
