BOUNTY ON EXPORTS.

New York, N. Y., July 14.—The Pacific slope States have recently become quite interested in a campaign conducted by David Lubin of Sacramento, Cal., a wealthy dry-goods merchant, who advocates the payment of an export bounty on staple agricultural products, and which proposition the Republican party of California adopted in 1894 as one of the planks in its platform. Mr. Lubin is a Republican and a protectionist and hopes to secure the insertion of his proposition in the National Republican platform as one of its planks.

Some months ago Mr. Lubin was asked to accept a proviso to his proposition, confining its application to such agricultural exports as were transported in ships owned and built in the United States. He arrived in New York to-night, having come East in order to ascertain whether he can obtain the cooperation of those interested in shipping in the advocacy of his proposed export bounty, provided he and the 2,000,000 farmers who are members of the Patrons of Husbandry and who, he says, are committed to his proposition, will use their influence to bring about the restoration of American shipping in the foreign trade.

A meeting of representative builders and owners of American ships will be held tomorrow morning in this city, which meeting Mr. Lubin will address on the subject of his proposed export bounty, and urge a union of efforts on the part of those interested in shipping, for mutual aid.

The chambers of commerce of San Francisco, Portland, Or., and Seattle have formerly endorsed Mr. Lubin's proposition, as he has united it to shipping, and before he returns to California Mr. Lubin hopes to obtain many similar endorsements from representative boards of trade and chambers of commerce in the East. The proposition has been extensively discussed in marine circles, and particularly in the publications devoted to that industry.

Mr. Lubin states that the proposition which he advocates is by no means a new one, but that it was adopted and pursued by Great Britain many years ago, when that empire was a protective nation. The British act requiring, however, that exports should be made in British ships manned by British seamen before the bounty would be paid. Should Mr. Lubin succeed in inducing the Nation to adopt his proposition it is the expectation of those interested in American shipping to limit the payment of the export bounty to such shipments as are made only in American built and owned ships. The outcome of Mr. Lubin's mission will be watched with considerable interest, no doubt, by the leaders of both the great political parties, there being nothing to show as yet, so far as has been learned, that the so-called Lubin proposition has received the endorsement of any of the Presidential timbers in the Republican party.—S. F. Call.
