Western Mining World: Hydraulic or placer mining presents fewer risks and more certainties than any other department of mining, other things being equal. It is simply a question of moving gravel or soil from one place to another. Given therefore in addition to an abundance of water to move and wash the gravel and ample space to deposit it again, after it has been washed and a problem of obtaining a profit is reduced to a minimum. Also in hydraulic mining there is the additional advantage of it being possible to ascertain approximately the value and extent of the gravel bed before working it and at a small cost, while vein or quartz mining must always be more or less and experiment and chance. Records show that over seventy-five per cent of all the gold mined within historic times has been derived from the working of gravel beds. The Rocky Mountain have been through the ages of the past gradually breaking down from Alaska to Cape Horn and the metal gold which existed in the innumerable veins of quartz which interlaced this great mountain mass in all directions, deposited by the gradual disintegration of the rocks in beds at the lower levels, forming placers of varying richness and practically inexhaustible. These gravel beds are "nature's gold filled vaults," inviting the enterprise, the energy and ingenuity of man, and promising, not irregular and doubtful returns which must more or less characterize the quartz mining, but steady and continuous results, and industry as legitimate and safe as agricultural or general trade.

DEMAND FOR PRUNES.

The Pacific Northwest says the natural home of the prune, and our inability to produce enough to make it an object for buyers to use our fruit is the only drawback to the business here.

We have the world for a customer and a demand will come from England and even Germany and France, when we are able to supply it. So far we have not produced enough to let the world know that we are in the world as producers.

The largest crop we ever produced was in 1891, and even then the whole United States did not produce enough to give our people one half pound each. California will probably produce in 1895, 12,000 tons; Washington 5,000 tons, and Oregon 1,000 tons, making a grand total of 27,000,000 pounds.

ONE CREAMERY'S WORK.

A new industry on the bay is the Toledo creamery, which has enjoyed a successful run since the day it was opened up last spring. Its first product was about 900 pounds per week, but within the heat of the summer, the product has run to about 450 pounds per week.

The butter turned out is of high grade, and is insufficient to support the heavy demand at Newport, on account of the summer business. Early in the season the creamery's product sold in Portland at the market price, but during the summer it has steadily brought 20 cents, and advance of six to eight cents on the market price in Portland for fancy creamery butter.

OVER-PRODUCTION OF HOPS.

We clip the following article from the Times-Herald, of Chicago. We are not prepared to say how much truth it contains, but coming from such high authorities as the Times-Herald, we give it as it is, and allow each of our readers to draw his own conclusions.

"The prospect for an unprecedented yield of hops this year are so encouraging that the dealers and raisers are not hopeful of deriving any benefit like a fair return for their investment of time and labor. Singularly enough, it is an inexorable law of supply and demand that conditions which are favorable to the consumer are not favorable to the producer."

As long as California and New York continue to raise hops there will be an overproduction, and the profits will therefore be meagre. It is estimated that 15,000 bales of hops were left on the poles in Washington last year, the growers being discouraged by the low prices.
