NEW POULTRY MARKET. Salem Statesman: Farmers and others interested in raising poultry will be glad to learn that hereafter they will have an active demand for all they may have to sell and not depending upon Portland alone for a market. Mark B. Katze, representing Chas. Jacobson & Co., of San Francisco has been in these parts a few days and has made arrangements whereby a special car provided for live poultry shipment will be loaded from Salem every two weeks and sent direct to San Francisco. C. T. Doty will be the Salem purchasing agent and the intention is to procure as many fowls as possible at this point and load them in the car as it arrives. Stops will be made at designated stations from here to Oakland, Oregon, until the car is filled. The first car was started last Wednesday from Eugene, the next will leave here on the 5th of February and regularly every two weeks thereafter. This will doubtly add a new impetus to the poultry business in Western Oregon, as Mr. Katze assured the Statesman last evening the sellers would obtain as good a price in net cash as they can get in Portland, and that they need not fear glutting the market.

Webfoot Planter: An examination of the figures as furnished by the state census shows that in many of the most populous parts of Oregon the apple crop of 1895 was less than that of 1881. This indicates two things. First: That the young orchards are not coming into bearing as fast as the old ones are failing. Second: That there is not the proper care bestowed on the older orchards.

There is no doubt but that many of these orchards have excellent varieties, and that the trees have not reached their limit of age, but either from insect ravages or soil exhaustion they have failed.

The first condition will doubtless correct itself, but the second is a more serious one, and should stand as a signal to all who are starting in the business now.

Trees need care and protection, and it is as true of our soil, as of that of other portions of the world, that it may be exhausted, and the fertility must be kept up by the application of plant food.
