THE ELECTRICAL REVIEW, 15 Park Row, New York City. A new disease to Oregon prune orchards is Brown Rot, and the whole product of several orchards were this year destroyed by it. Many Oregon prune men are unaware of it, but in many Eastern states it has proven very destructive. Not only is the fruit on the trees attacked but, after being picked it is oftentimes destroyed by the disease. If allowed to go unchecked it will prove as destructive to prunes as is codling moth or scab to the apple crop. Leaves, flowers and fruit are attacked by the disease, but it is upon fruit that most damage is done. The fungus enters the cells of the fruit, robs them of their contents and rot ensues. Ash gray spores cover the fruit, these in time disappear and the fruit shrivels and hangs in this condition upon the trees. The rotting fruit should be collected and destroyed, and spraying should be applied as in shot-hole fungus.—Corvallis Times.
