Bro. Bruce Wolverton writes us that he has quite a lot of books on hand which he has removed from Portland to Corvallis, his present home. He has especially the Commentary on Acts by Prof. J. W. McGarvey, and Analysis of the Gospels and Acts by Pres. R. Milligan, which he offers for sale at cost plus postage. MISS WILLARD'S VISIT.—The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of California has just issued the following circular which fully explains itself:

To the Christian Temperance People of California, Oregon and the Territories.

DEAR FRIENDS: It is our pleasant duty to inform you that by invitation of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of California we are soon to have a visit from Miss Frances E. Willard of Chicago, President of the National W. C. T. U., and her private secretary, Miss Anna Gordon of Boston. These ladies have traveled, organized and spoken in every State east of the Rocky mountains, having made three trips to the Southern States. Everywhere they have been received with the utmost kindness by pastors and people, and treated with courtesy and consideration by the press. They aim to reach the leading towns in California and Oregon, also in all the Territories and Nevada. Misses Willard and Gordon desire especially to meet the Christian women for prayer and conference on the question. What can we do to protect

our homes and tempted loved ones from the ravages of the drink habit and the liquor traffic?

It is hoped that young women may be especially enlisted to attend these meetings.

Evening meetings will also be held open to the public free, at which collections will be taken for the payment of current expenses. Miss Willard leaves lucrative engagements to make this trip, and makes no demand whatever upon us, but we desire to meet the cost of her trip. Let any pastor, temperance worker, lady, or friend of the cause, who desires to secure the personal aid of Miss Willard, address Mrs. H. H. Haven, Blake House, Oakland, Cal., before March 1st.

Now as it is a settled fact that Miss Willard is to come to this coast in the near future, the question arises, What are the temperance people of Oregon going to do in view of her visit? So far, we have learned of no move in the State to secure her services. In all probability this is the only opportunity the people of Oregon will ever have of seeing and hearing this great temperance worker, and they should make haste to extend her an invitation to spend some time among us. Without doubt, Miss Willard is one of the most gifted, able and eloquent temperance lecturers in the field. Having had the pleasure of listening to her a few months since, we know whereof we affirm. Besides, she is none of your "Woman's Rights" masculine females, neither is she unreasonable or fanatical in the work; but she is simply an earnest, conscientious temperance advocate, realizing that she has the truth to present to the people, and that she does it in such a way that it can neither be scoffed at or gainsayed. She is handsome, modest, unassuming, courteous to all, respectful to those who differ from her, and commands the respect and the attention of both friends and foes, and wields a powerful moral influence for the the cause of temperance wherever she goes. Let the principal towns of Oregon by all means take steps at once to secure her services.
