This, our report of the work done in Seattle since our organization, will be handed to you by Bro. S. Denney, who is also our delegate to your convention.

We organized Sunday, Sept. 24, 1882, with a membership of 12. Bro. J. W. Osborn was chosen as elder and Bros. S. G. Benedict and Henry Denney as deacons. We have since received into our congregation 9 members, 2 by immersion and 7 by letter, making our total membership at the present 21 members.

We have a church house partly completed, in which we hope to meet before long. The lot 34x60 ft. was a present to the church by Bro. S.
