

**A Temperance Campaign.**

The Western States — some of them at least—are going ahead of the East in putting down the liquor traffic. Farmers and others are waking up to the fact that the greatest part of their taxes is caused by the use of intoxicating drinks, and they are justly resolved to employ wise legislation to protect themselves.

In this city the citizens last spring held meetings, one outcome of which was the appointment of a committee to prepare a wise and just bill to regulate the traffic. It is now proposed to hold a series of meetings in twenty-four cities of the State, in which to discuss the salient features of the new bill to be drawn by Judges Arnoux and Peabody. In each city a drawing-room meeting will be held in the house of some prominent citizen, to be followed by a mass meeting. Representatives of all religious communions and political parties will be invited, while the new bill will be discussed by a deputation from this city. The bill will be submitted to the Legislature at Albany next winter.

These meetings are to be organized by means of the Church Temperance Society. But there is no sectarianism in the movement, and we bespeak for them the warm support of all ministers and people. Let us rouse the whole State from Niagara to Montauk. The occasion demands it.—*N. Y. Observer.*
