If in the course of duty you are tried by the distrust of friends, gird up your loins and say in your heart, "I was not driven to virtue by the encouragement of friends, nor will I be repelled from it by their coldness." Finally, be just and fear not; "corruption wins not more than honesty;" truth lives and reigns when falsehood dies and rots.—Spurgeon.
