WIDE AWAKE is publishing a short serial story by Mrs. A. D. T. Whitney, with the quaint and suggestive title of "Buttered Crusts."

The third series of Little Biographies will embody the universally desired knowledge of "How Success is Won," and will be written by Mrs. Sarah K. Bolten, recently of the Congregationalist editorial staff; these biographies will be welcomed for their freshness, the twelve representative men chosen being successful men of our own time and country. Tales of the Pathfinders, by Arthur Gilman, M. A., will give, under the vivid light of to-day, the traditions and romantic history of the earliest Atlantic voyages and New World discoveries and conquests.

OBITUARY.

Robert Shipley was born August 13, 1814, died August 31, 1883 aged 69 years and 17 days. He was born in Kentucky and moved to Missouri with his parents when 5 years of age, emigrating to Oregon in the year of 1853. He joined the Christian Church when young, in which he lived a member until death. He raised a large family of children several of which survive him.

Thomas M. Royal, son of Elder J. B. Royal, was born September 29, 2842, in Sangamon County, Illinois. He enlisted in Company 27th Ill., Infantry in

1861. In 1863 was discharged and re-enlisted and served till the close of the war. He was color sergeant of his regiment. He was in many hard fought battles, but escaped with his life. He moved with his family to Kansas in 1878, and died in Wichita, August 10, 1883. Word was telegraphed to his father of his dangerous illness, but he did not reach there until he was buried. He united with the Church of Christ some years ago and the dear Savior gave him solace in the presence of death. He was rational, and his only trouble was his two little girls, one ten and the other twelve years old, and whose mother had died six years before, who by his death would be entirely orphaned, but C. P. Shafer, a good man assured him that in case of his death they should be sent to their grandfather in Vermont. Ill. This gave his mind relief and he died in peace trusting in the Lord. Bro. Royal, father of the deceased, wishes me to say that he has never met truer and better friends than on his sorrowful mission to Wichita. He hereby expresses his sincere thanks to the citizens of Wichita, and especially Garfield Post No. 25, who buried him with military honors, and D. R. Allen and wife, in whose house he died, and C. P. Shafer and wife who gave him assurance in regard to his children and to the press of the city, which tendered so many words of tenderness and sympathy. May the good Father in Heaven smile favorably on these that proved themselves such good friends to our dear old friend brother, while he must carry the burden of sorrow.
