Behringer, Brooklyn, N. Y. The memorial celebration of the four hundreth anniversary of Luther's birth is exciting a world-wide interest. Aside from all religious questions, the great Reformer occupies a conspicuous place in history, and as a historical character alone his life is worthy of study. To present an attractive and popular record of the man, which shall at the same time be scholarly and reliable, is the aim of this volume. It retains all that is interesting in the two volumes (not the condensed work issued in one volume in Germany and announced for publication in this country) of Kostlin's extensive work, omitting abstruse and technical points of purely theological interest, and yet presenting the salient features of its sub ject in so attractive a manner that the interest never flags.
