

Weather Report.

During January, 1884, there were 10 days during which rain fell and an aggregate of 3.45 in. of water, 11 clear, 5 fair and 5 cloudy days, other than those on which rain fell.

The mean temperature for the month was 36.94°. Highest daily mean temperature for the month 51° on the 4th. Lowest daily mean, 28° on the 1st and 24.

Mean temperature for the month at 2 o'clock P. M. 43.10°. Highest temperature for the month 57° at 2 o'clock P. M. on the 4th. Lowest temperature 18° at 7 o'clock A. M. on the 24th.

Frosts occurred on the 1, 2, 10, 11, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31.

The prevailing winds for the month were from the north during 18 days, S. W. 12 days, S. 1 day.

During January, 1883, there were 17 rainy days, and aggregate of 7.87 in. of water. 3 clear and 11 cloudy days.

Mean temp. for the month 36.03°. Highest daily temp. 50° on 30th. Lowest daily temp. 9° on 19th.
