# **Districts dodge bullet this time**

"In these tough economic times" is a phrase we haven't heard in a while, and we liked it that way.

Now, with the state Senate and House of Representatives approving a school budget for \$7.255 billion — which sounds like a lot, but isn't when you divide it between 197 school districts in Oregon — it feels like we've slid a bit back down the hole of recession.

The number isn't far from the hoped-for \$7.5 billion, which would have allowed our local school districts to maintain recently restored programs and even add a few things back, but when talking dollars and cents at the government level, it's miles away.

Fortunately for Dallas, Central and Perrydale districts, the amount won't hurt too badly. They'll be able to continue the good fight. But in Falls City, the news was grim.

Falls City Superintendent Jack Thompson compared this budget to putting the district back on life support. Cuts will have to be made. In a such a small district, where one senior can make a significant difference in graduation rates, cuts will also be felt on a grander scale than in a larger district.

And this budget is not considering that districts are going into negotiations with their teachers and certified staff. Last time, teacher negotiations came to a stalemate in Central and are ongoing in Perrydale. One of the issues at stake in both districts was increases in wages.

We'd wager that will happen again. Teachers, administrators and certified staff members have gone a long time through the dry spell created by the recession, and want some compensation for past pay freezes.

Politicians in Salem whisper hope of better forecasts in May, which may increase the school budget, but no one is thinking that will come to fruition.

It feels like more empty promises from the leaders of our state made to our schools. The worst part about it is it's not being made to our school boards, administrators and teachers as much as to our kids who are our future leaders. It's time for those in the Capitol to pay it forward for these kids to get a better education.
