It was determined that there was no trauma and that Taylor either attempted to hold her breath too long or hyperventilated herself and passed out. Kora and her mother, Angie thought that Taylor was messing around and doing the dead man's float. They were able to get her out of the pool and her mother performed CPR but this did not save her life.
