

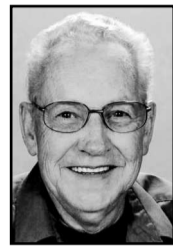
OBITUARIES

He was preceded in death by his wife, Thelma, on April 28, 2005.

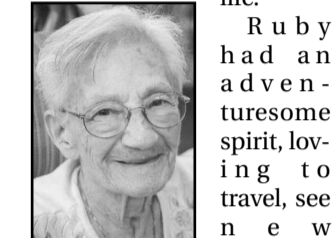

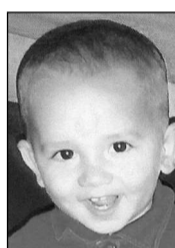
