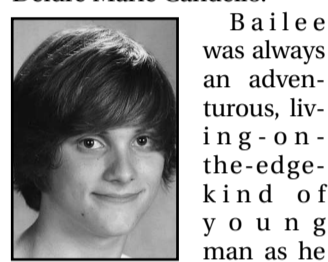

June 27, 1920 – Feb. 25, 2016

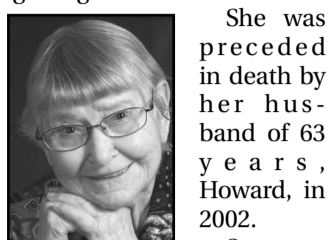
Brownie Hannah Fausset, 95, longtime Dallas resident died Feb. 25 in Salem.

John Dersch Heronemus

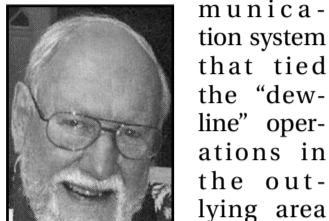
Nov. 28, 1921 – March 1, 2016

John Dersch Heronemus, 94, of Dallas, formerly of Escondido, Calif., died March 1.

John attended Northwest-

ern University and was enrolled in the Navy. He led an eventful life and visited every continent except Antarctica. He was part of the first group of men to cross the Arctic Circle under the Eisenhower Administration in 1956. John helped set up the "dew-line," an early warning system designed to detect unaccounted for aircraft in Alaska. He then helped to set up the communication system that tied the "dew-line" operations in the outlying area of Alaska into the main monitoring center in Anchorage.



John retired in 1991 from General Dynamics in Pomona, Calif., as an electric engineer.

John was a member of the Reformed Church of America in Escondido for 28 years. He had more than 25 years working with the Boy Scouts and 28 years as a volunteer with hospice.
