Independence is playing the odds

The city of Independence is prepared to spend another \$3.5 million on Independence Landing — the former Valley Concrete site — to build roads, water and sewer systems, as well as streetscape — which is what makes the sidewalks downtown look attractive.

The city has already spent roughly \$1.2 million on the property — \$800,000 purchasing the riverfront acreage in November 2014, and about half a million getting it what cities call "shovel-ready," leveling the land, demolishing existing structures, anything that needs to get done so the developer doesn't have to.

All said and done, should the total \$3.5 million be spent on the infrastructure project, the city will be into this property for roughly \$4.7 million.

City leaders say it will be money well spent when a hotel is completed as well as retail and housing units on the riverfront. True, the desired project will enhance the downtown area and add a lot of foot traffic, benefiting all who do business and live in downtown Independence.

The city says it is still in talks with Tokola Properties for developing some of Independence Landing, and that building the roads and infrastructure will help in those negotiations.

Leaders expect to recoup the invested millions through tax revenues generated once the building is completed.

But with no agreements officially signed, it's an educated guess at best — at worst, it's a catastrophe waiting to happen.

The city has done due diligence in exploring hotel development, but so far no one has put their money where their mouths are, except for the city itself.

That's a lot of taxpayer dollars to be spending on a gamble. We hope it pays off for Independence.





City should find innovative funding

The Dallas Aquatic Center is used by all ages and benefits the entire community. The city should consider innovative ways to improve funding including:

Buy-in charges paid by new property owners similar to water and sewer facilities where new residents buy into the improvements that were initially built and paid for by existing property owners.

Special assessment district for new property owners — an assessment district to capture newly developed properties which would be assessed a portion of the pro-rata cost of operations of the aquatics center.

Redevelopment agency revenues — tax increment or other revenues whereby the amount of property tax revenue available from properties within a certain area are frozen as of the creation of the district. Revenues from within the district that are attributable to an increase in assessed value are allocated to the aquatic center and could be

used to retire bonds.

Joint financing — the school district could partner with the city to pay a proportional amount of the operations costs based on their usage of the facility. This could include reimbursement for the initial cost of construction.

Community foundation — a 501(c)(3) foundation that can collect tax-deductible donations used for operation of the aquatics center. Volunteers could spear-

head programs to obtain additional revenues.
