Cornerstone land acquisition would protect Willamette Valley habitat for fish and wildlife

The Bonneville Power Administration intends to fund the purchase of approximately 87 acres of oak savanna habitat near the town of Dallas in Polk County, Ore. When the purchase is complete, the Polk Soil and Water Conservation District will own and manage the property for fish and wildlife conservation purposes. BPA will receive a conservation easement to ensure that the habitat values on the property are always protected.

Funding this land purchase partially fulfills commitments made by BPA in the 2010 Willamette River Basin Memorandum of Agreement Regarding Wildlife Habitat Protection and Enhancement between the State of Oregon and the Bonneville Power Administration. This is part of ongoing efforts to mitigate for the impacts to fish and wildlife from the construction and operation of federal flood control and hydroelectric facilities in the Willamette River Basin. These properties will provide long-lasting fish and wildlife benefits and will become one of a growing network of conservation lands in the Willamette Valley.

The Polk Soil and Water Conservation District will develop a management plan to guide the protection and enhancement of habitat on the property. BPA and ODFW will review the plan for consistency with the conservation purposes of the land acquisition.
