Center Street Bridge repair continues

WEST SALEM — Repair work on Salem's Center Street Bridge, the Highway 22 bridge that carries eastbound traffic into Salem from Polk County, has resumed.

The contractor has applied a waterproof membrane and will complete paving in the coming weeks. Once paving is finished, crews will replace the bridge joints. Conditions on the bridge will remain rough and bumpy until

the project is complete. Drivers are urged to slow down on the bridge, especially in areas where the bridge joints are creating significant bumps. Work on the bridge takes place Sunday through Thursday

from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. No work is scheduled for Fridays and Saturdays. There could be multiple lanes closed at any one time. During the evening, travelers should leave extra time for eastbound travel on Highway 22 into Salem, and expect delays of up

The \$2.5 million project is on schedule to be completed by Aug.15, prior to the Great American Eclipse on Aug. 21 and start of the Oregon State Fair on Aug. 25.
