She graduated from Atlantic High School, attended Tarkio College, transferring to the University of Iowa, where she completed her undergraduate degree in physical education.

Dot and Bob served 37 years doing agricultural mission work under the United Presbyterian Church in Egypt and later in Thailand.

She liked to wink and say, "I went to Egypt with four head of cattle and returned with five kids!"

Dot lived her life investing in people, whether in rural development, leadership training, school administration, teaching, coaching or in retirement.

She was a gift to those around the world who had the opportunity to know her.

She was preceded in death by daughter, Carol Turnbull (1998) and husband Robert (2004).

She is survived by daughters Ann Turnbull (Brainerd, Minn.), Janet Sheldon (Monmouth), Nancy Loh (Mountain View, Calif.), and son, Lee Turnbull (Tiffin, Iowa); along with their spouses, six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
