

WILL ASK FOR \$700,000. A conference was held in Port-

land Friday between the full Congressional delegation from the state of Oregon, comprising Senators Mitchell and Fulton and Congressmen Williamson and Hermann, and a committee on behalf of the Lewis and Clark Fair, and Jefferson Myers, president of the Lewis and Clark Exposition State Commission. The object of the conference was to discuss the question of securing an appropriation from Congress at the next session for the fair. The matter was thoroughly discussed by all the gentlemen in attendance, the representatives of the fair presenting what they thought would be reasonable requests, and the honorable gentlemen who represent the state calling attention to the difficulties that would be encountered and the most practical method of bringing the matter before Congress so as to procure favorable action.






