RE-ENACT THE OLD LAW.

The average citizen dreads a session of the Legislature about as much as he does an epidemic of small-pox. If any person doubts this statement, let him question the first half-dozen men he meets as to whether, in their opinion, a special session to remedy the defect in the new tax law is advisable. If the people of Oregon could only have assurance that the Legislature would meet and pass the needed legislation and then promptly adjourn, there would be no serious objection to a special session being called. But the fear that other laws might be tinkered with and general legislation indulged in for the full period of twenty days causes the great majority of citizens to view a special session with grave apprehension. Governor Chamberlain, himself, seems to share this feeling, and has announced that he will not issue a call for a special session unless it shall be demonstrated to his satisfaction that correction of this law is absolutely necessary for the protection of the public service and to prevent the placing of state, county and city officers at the mercy of warrant brokers.

The Observer believes that the best interests of the state would be subserved by a prompt reenactment of the old tax law. However, it should be thoroughly impressed upon the mind of every member of the Legislature that the people are in no mood for a lengthy session, and that if a special session is called the lawmakers will be expected to transact no business further than to make the necessary change in this law. Two or three days, at the outside, is time enough. If this course is pursued, no great expense need be incurred, and the taxpayers will save the enormous interest charges that they would be compelled to pay in case no session were called.

The result of Tuesday's election possesses no particular National significance. The vote in Ohio is an emphatic endorsement of Senator Hanna, and the victory won by Tammany has no bearing on National issues. New York State is Republican, and can be counted upon to give the Presidential ticket a heavy majority next year. It is also about time to take Indiana out of the doubtful column. The Hoosier State can safely be placed in the Republican list, when making up a forecast of the result of the contest in 1904.

Senator B. F. Mulkey wired County Clerk U. S. Loughary last night that he still claims his residence in Polk county, and that he will take his seat in the Senate if a special session of the Legislature is called. This is pleasing news to the people of Polk county, as it was feared that Senator Mulkey might have exercised his right of citizenship elsewhere and that the county might be put to the expense of holding a special election to fill a vacancy in the Senate.

Out of the 84 appealed cases decided by the Supreme Court and reported in Volume 42 of the Oregon Supreme Court reports, 57 were affirmed, 23 reversed and four modified. Judge Hamilton, of the Second District, has the best record, with 100 per cent of his appealed cases affirmed; Judge Burnett comes second with a record of 87 1/2 per cent of affirmances; Judge Boise takes sixth place, with 65 per cent of affirmances.

Cresfield and Brooks, two apostles of the "Holy Rollers," having no desire to roll in tar and feathers, rolled out of Corvallis Sunday night, and the excitement is now subsiding.

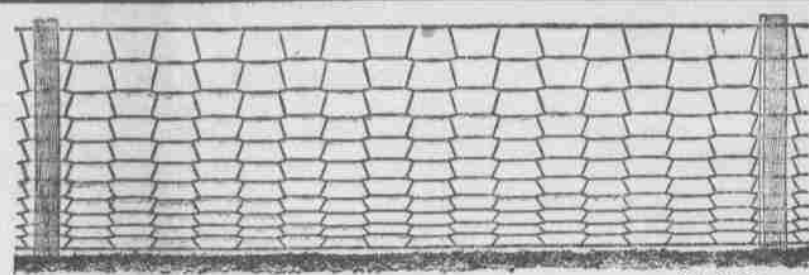
