BAND BOYS' ANNUAL BALL

Promises to be Social Event of the Season at Falls City.

The Falls City Band will give its annual ball in Bryan-Lucas Hall in Falls City on Wednesday, November 25, (Thanksgiving Eve). The boys are making active preparation to make this ball the social event of the season, and from present indications the crowd in attendance will be the largest ever gathered together in Polk county upon an occasion of this kind. The Bryan-Lucas Hall, where the dance is to be held, has the best dancing floor in the county, and the room is large enough to accommodate 100 or more couples, the dimensions being 40 by 80 feet. The Independence orchestra has been secured by the management, at a heavy expense, to furnish music for the occasion.

A large crowd of dancers is expected from Dallas, Independence, Monmouth, and other towns in the county. The Dallas & Falls City railroad will make a special rate of 35 cents for the round trip on its regular train. This arrangement will prove a drawing card for Dallas people, as it will enable them to make the trip with every comfort and convenience. The young people of this city will show their friendship and good-will toward their neighbors of Falls City by turning out in large numbers and helping to make the band boys' annual ball one of the merriest events of the year.

NO FEAR OF BURGLARS

Officers of Dallas City Bank Are Not Alarmed by Raids at Newberg and Sheridan.

The attempt to rob the Bank of Newberg two weeks ago and the successful raid on the Sheridan bank last Sunday night are not causing the officers of the Dallas City Bank the least concern for the safety of their property and the funds entrusted to their keeping. 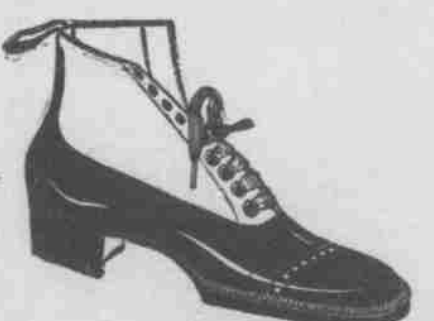
