## CHANGE IS NEEDED Present Method of Handling Prunes Not Satisfactory to the Growers.

There is one thing which appears quite certain and that is that the present system of handling prunes in the Pacific Northwest will soon pass away. The selling of prunes must go into the hands of men who are interested in keeping up the industry and who will make persistent and intelligent efforts to enlarge the demand for our prunes. Under existing conditions, outside of the associations and a few companies and individuals who make a specialty of curing and packing prunes, those who buy prunes in the Pacific Northwest have no interest in the prune industry except as an incidental and comparatively insignificant portion of their business. From their standpoint the only way to increase sales is to cut down prices. With many classes of merchandise this method is effective. In the case of prunes it has very little effect. It can not be observed that the consumption of prunes in the United States is materially affected by the price. An increased demand for Italian prunes will come not from cheapening the price but from persistent and well directed efforts to get them into the hands of those who know nothing of their merits. Well managed and strong associations of growers can do this work. The class of buyers we now have in the field will not do it because they have not enough at stake. Unless the growers do the work through associations there will in time develop a class of dealers whose whole interest will be in the prune business and who will cure and
