

#### YESTERDAY'S PRIMARIES.

The Republican primaries held in the several precincts yesterday afternoon were orderly and quiet, as primaries in Polk county always are, and the contests were remarkably free from partisan bitterness, notwithstanding the intense interest and enthusiastic work of the friends of the various candidates. The attendance was unusually large in every precinct although the weather conditions were ideal for outdoor work. In a majority of the precincts, the vote cast in the primaries was larger than the total Republican vote in the same precincts at the June election two years ago-an attendance unheard of before in Polk county primary elections. Interest throughout the county centered in the contest in the three Dallas precincts, and the battle here was close and exciting.
