RARE MUSICAL TREAT

Mrs. Beatrice Barlow Dierke Will Give Piano Recital in Normal Chapel.

Music lovers of Polk county are to have a rare treat April 23, if present plans can be carried to a successful issue. It is possible to secure Mrs. Beatrice Barlow Dierke, of Portland, in a piano recital, if a sufficient guarantee can be raised. President Ressler has undertaken to secure the guarantee, and hopes to gain the support and co-operation of all the musical people. To this end, efforts are being made to run special motors from Dallas and Independence.

Mrs. Dierke is an Oregon girl of whom every loyal citizen of Oregon should feel proud, and her future career will no doubt shed great lustre on her native state. She is undoubtedly a genius, and the high praise given her by Rosenthal, Padarewski, Godowski, and other celebrated artists for whom she has played, could only have been received for exceptional merit. In fact Mrs. Dierke today has earned a place among the foremost pianists of the world. She has refused flattering offers to tour the eastern states, preferring to bide her time and make her debut in Europe.

A special concession will be made in the price of admission, the usual charge of \$1.00 being reduced to 50 cents. The Ellers Piano House will send up a \$2000 concert grand piano, largest size, for the occasion. The concert will be given in the chapel of the Normal at Monmouth and should draw a full house.

WILL BUILD LARGE MILL

F. J. Coad Will Enlarge Capacity of Dallas Planing Mill.

F. J. Coad, who has successfully conducted a planing mill and sash and door factory in Dallas for many years, has decided to abandon his present location, and, as soon as he can secure a suitable lot, will begin the construction of a mill of much greater capacity than the one now operated by him. He has sold his interest in the Dallas water power to the Dallas Flouring Mill Company, and is advertising to sell the building now occupied by his plant.

Mr. Coad is seeking a location in Dallas where he will have good shipping facilities, more room for handling lumber, and where the insurance rates will be lower than those he is compelled to pay at the present time. Plans for the new mill have not been drawn, but it is probable that the building will be only one story high, and that all the machinery will be under one roof. To his already extensive and modern plant, he will add a large amount of new machinery, so that the daily capacity of the mill may be greatly increased, if necessary.

The Coad planing mill is one of Dallas' important manufacturing institutions, and the news that the plant is to be made larger and better in every respect will be welcomed by our people.
