The only charge preferred against Bert Turner at the preliminary hearing in Corvallis, Tuesday evening, was for carrying a concealed weapon. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney E. R. Bryson says that the evidence that Turner assisted or encouraged Keady in the shooting of either Dunn or Osburn is not forthcoming. Turner was sentenced to 50 days in the county jail and \$10 fine.
