Boer Leader Visits Dallas.
General Joubert, of South Africa, who is, or at least claims to be, a nephew of the late General Joubert of the Transvaal, lectured in the City Hall to a fair-sized audience last Friday evening. He gave an interesting talk on the early history of South Africa and the settling of that country by the Dutch. He also described the tactics of the Boers in their recent great struggle for liberty. The lecture was illustrated with excellent stereoscopic views. General Joubert says that the reports recently sent out from St. Louis to the effect that he is an impostor are the result of jealousy on the part of personal enemies, and declares that he has letters, papers and other evidence to prove his identity beyond question. He left on the early train Saturday for Portland.

Measured the Reservoir.
John P. VanOrsdel, the civil engineer, employed by the Dallas council to measure the new water reservoir on Kraber hill, west of town, performed the work Wednesday morning and will submit his report to the council at the first meeting in June. The reservoir is built of concrete, and is a substantial piece of work. It is cylindrical in form, and is 11.81 feet deep. The diameter at the bottom is 53 feet, and at the top 89.25 feet. The capacity is in round numbers 322,000 gallons. Mr. Gates' contract with the city calls for a reservoir capacity of not less than 300,000 gallons. The council is highly pleased with the work.
