SIX ARE GRADUATED
Dallas College Closes Successful Year's
Work With Interesting
Exercises.
 The commencement exercises of
 Dallas College, held in the college
 chapel this week, bring to a close
 another highly successful year of
 school work. The attendance of
 students for the session of 1903-04 has
 far exceeded that of any former year,
 and the college is now firmly estab-
 lished on a solid and lasting founda-
 tion. A large percentage of this year's
 students have expressed their inten-
 tion of returning next Fall, and an
 active canvass for new students will
 be made throughout the counties of
 Western Oregon by the members of
 the faculty during the Summer vaca-
 tion. The already strong course of
 study will be improved and strength-
 ened, needed building improvements
 will be made, necessary apparatus
 supplied, and everything gotten in
 readiness for still more thorough
 work when school opens next Sep-
 tember.
 The commencement exercises began
 last Thursday night with an interest-
 ing entertainment by members of the
 Sorosis Literary Society. The young
 ladies gave an excellent program. On
 Friday night, the Philadelphia
 Literary Society held its annual re-
 union, followed by a banquet at the
 Hotel Gail. An elaborate menu was
 discussed, after which there were
 toasts by President C. C. Poling, Prof.
 D. M. Metzger, Harrison Barendrick,
 Dean Collins, Dan Poling and Chester
 Gates. Alex VanOrsdel presided as
 toastmaster. On Saturday evening,
 the students gave an open-air recep-
 tion to President Poling in the City
 Park. An enjoyable impromptu pro-
 gram was given, and all gathered
 around a bonfire and made merry un-
 til a late hour.
 The baccalaureate sermon was
 preached in the M. E. Church, Sunday
 morning, at 11 o'clock. The church
 was crowded with friends of the
 graduating class, and the masterful
 discourse by Dr. Poling was deeply
 appreciated and enjoyed by all. At 3
 o'clock in the afternoon, the Christian
 Associations held their farewell meet-
 ings, and at 8 o'clock in the evening
 listened to a sermon by Rev. E. Cur-
 ran, of Hillsboro. The lecture before
 the literary societies on Monday eve-
 ning by Dr. W. C. Kantner, of Salem,
 was one of the rare treats of com-
 mencement week. Dr. Kantner has
 few equals as a lecturer on the Pacific
 Coast, and his talk Monday night was
 entertaining and instructive in the
 highest degree. The annual program
 of the Musical Department was given
 on Tuesday evening and was under
 the direction of C. W. Kantner,
 musical director of the College. In
 vocal and instrumental work, the
 students all showed great proficiency
 —the result of being taught and
 trained by a master musician.
 The field meet scheduled to take
 place Tuesday afternoon was aban-
 doned at the last moment and in its
 place a lively game of baseball was
 played by the college team and a
 picked nine from among the town
 boys. The college team won by a
 score of 15 to 9. Prof. W. I. Reynolds,
 principal of the Dallas public school,
 acted as umpire.
 The commencement exercises were
 held in the chapel on Wednesday.
 The stage was beautifully decorated
 with flowers and the college colors
 were everywhere in evidence. The
 graduating class wore the regulation
 caps and gowns. Miss Ethel Poling,
 a graduate from the Musical Depart-
 ment, delightfully rendered three
 piano solos during the morning—a
 waltz by Durand, "Farewell to the
 Piano," by Beethoven, and the "Mel-
 ody in F," by Rubenstein. Miss Inez
 Allen, of Rickreall, a graduate from
 the Academic course, had for the sub-
 ject of her oration "Builders of State."
 The young lady spoke in a well-mod-
 erated voice, was graceful in every
 move, and her oration gave evidence
 of deep thought and a thorough
 understanding of her subject. Miss
 Bertha Allen, also a graduate from
 the Academic Department, held the
 closest attention of the large audience
 for twenty minutes by the delivery of
 an excellent oration entitled "Decay
 of the Races." Daniel A. Poling, one
 of Oregon's brightest young men and
 the first student to finish the Classical
 Course in Dallas College, took for
 the subject of his theme the simple word
 "Service." His oration, unlike those
 of many college graduates, was prac-
 tical and full of every-day common
 sense. In bringing out the thought
 that nothing of real value can be
 gained without honest, earnest effort,
 and that faithful service ends
 only at the close of life, the young
 man charmed his hearers with his
 matchless eloquence. The oration
 was highly creditable to the orator
 and to Dallas College. The address
 to the class was delivered by the
 President of the college.
 The exercises came to a close with
 the annual reunion and banquet of
 the Alumni Association on Wednesday
 evening. Rev. D. V. Poling, pastor
 of the First Congregational Church
 of The Dalles, gave the annual ad-
 dress, and there were many interesting
 literary and musical numbers on the
 program. The banquet in the Dornit-
 ory was largely attended, and mirth
 and good-fellowship reigned supreme
 until midnight.
